SEASONAL SHIFT

The Highs and Lows of Home Comfort

C ooling your home can take quite a bit of your cold, hard cash. And the air conditioner itself – based on its age, condition and energy-efficiency rating – has a lot to do with whether you're spending more or less.

Central air conditioners are not created equal, and you see the differences in the SEER, a rating standard for "seasonal energy efficiency ratio". The higher the SEER, the better the energy efficiency.

Air conditioners are significant investments for any home. Plus, there's the operational costs. Overall, you'll want to look for a balanced investment – comparing the air conditioner's cost with your monthly operational savings. Here's your range of options:

 High/Low – Yes, they cost more upfront, but they also save more. Many homeowners prefer the logic of a higher upfront cost that saves them months after on their energy dollars. For high-efficiency central air conditioners, you'll look for 16 to 23 SEER.

- Mid When you see SEER

 14.5 to 17, you're in midrange efficiency for central air conditioners. They're priced a little lower than the higher efficiency units and have a few less benefits. If you're replacing an air conditioner that's more than 12 to 15 years old, this would seem like top of the line by comparison.
- Low/High Minimum energy efficiency comes in a 13 to 14.5 SEER air conditioner. The lower initial cost won't bring as high a level of savings on the operational costs, but many homeowners on a tight budget will consider this to be a good value.

Have You Heard of QR Codes?

f you've had any internet experience, you've used links that take you from one webpage to another. But now a bit of technology is changing the way you can interact with the web. If you have a phone with a camera that can access the Internet, you can now link from a physical object – say, this very newsletter – and go straight to a website. How?

The technology is called QR codes (Quick Response). The QR code looks similar to a barcode you'd see on any product you buy. Instead of straight lines, however, you'll see a square filled in with varying patterns that contain digital information. With QR codes you can receive weather forecasts, news updates, "discount" alerts or other types of info from the codes you choose to scan. You can get started by trying out the QR code on the back of this newsletter.

For the QR code to work, however, you'll need a QR code reader installed on your phone. That's easy. A free code scanner is available at **www.neoreader.com** and other locations on the web (just Google QR Code Reader from your smartphone). Once your code reader is installed and you begin scanning QR codes, you can download contact information and other details directly to your phone, making it easy to access and pocket-portable.

Home Improvements That Pay Off (or Turn Off)

ome values have slumped and the stock market is a rocky ride, but some investments can still increase value while enriching your quality of life. Certain home improvements are likely to improve the value of your home – and, hopefully, make it more attractive to a buyer down

the road. But strategy helps – because some home improvements don't improve home value and can even lessen the ability to sell.

So where's the

payoff and what's the turn off? Most experts say making changes in the kitchen and bathroom are a "go" and can earn homeowners an 80% and upward return on investment for remodeling projects.

Kitchen Remodeling – The kitchen is the center of family activity and the most-used room in the house. Some of the areas where you can give attention are new plumbing fixtures, energy-efficient appliances, solid surface countertops, tile flooring and recessed lighting.

Bathroom Remodeling -

Investments in a bathroom remodel are also viewed favorably. You can start with the plumbing where it is and replace outdated fixtures, maybe tub and toilet too. Other areas include updated lighting, tile floors and vanity.

Outdoors – Adding a deck or patio yields a good return – a covered patio in particular. Landscaping is still a great bet too. It adds value and can be done with limited budget. Also, landscaping in the front adds that everattractive "curb appeal" that will impress your friends and neighbors and entice a future buyer.

Some areas of improvement,

Some home improvements don't improve home value and can even lessen the ability to sell. however, don't tend to yield a good return on investment. What areas are a "no"? A swimming pool could deter a significant pool of future buyers.

Also, while an outdoor kitchen is attractive and enjoyable, it's not the way to cook up a higher home value. Look for the "home value" caution flag in these areas too: converting a garage into a family room and converting a spare bedroom to an office.

Another upside of making home improvements now is that the cost may be less, starting with a low interest rate on a home equity line of credit. Additionally, contractors that aren't as busy as they once were may offer a discounted price, and home building materials that aren't as much in demand may be available at a better price.

Poison Prevention Begins with Smart Practices

As you spruce up your lawn or garden for the greener days to come, you'll find many elements that you'd be pleased to see eradicated – like weeds and pests. But the poisons and chemicals that take care of business at hand can cause serious problems if they end up where they're not intended.

Following these guidelines from the Home Safety Council can help keep your family and your pets safe:

- Read the labels of products you buy and keep in your home. If you see the words, "Caution," "Warning," "Danger," "Poison" or "Keep Out of Reach of Children," be very careful.
- Store poisons in a place where children cannot see or touch them. Use child safety locks. Products you should keep locked up include: pesticides, automotive fluids, charcoal lighter, paint thinner, antifreeze and turpentine. Ideally, hazardous products should be stored in a locking cabinet.
- Keep products in the container they came in. Do not put them

in a different bottle or jar.

- Do not mix products together because their contents could react together with dangerous results.
- Gasoline is very dangerous inside a home or garage. Gasoline vapors can explode with just a tiny spark. Never bring or use gasoline indoors. Use it as motor fuel only. If you must keep gasoline at home, use a special safety container.
- When using harsh products, follow directions. For example, use gloves, eye goggles and masks if the label says so.
- Pesticides to kill bugs, mice and rats are extremely dangerous. If possible, have a professional help you.
- Mix insect sprays outdoors, away from areas used by your family and pets.
- Pool chemicals are poisonous and can catch on fire. Store and use pool chemicals according to the manufacturer's directions. Keep them tightly covered in the containers they came in. Keep them dry and away from other chemicals and products.



Clear the Air

When we think air pollution, we think smoggy cities and urban areas, while in reality, it is the air in our own homes that can aggravate allergies and damage our health. These tips can help you combat airborne irritants in your home:

- Use an air cleaner that combines HEPA technology and carbon air filtration to clear tobacco smoke, pet hair and dander, dust mites, molds, bacteria and pollen.
- Improve your home's ventilation. Keep inside doors open. Use the vents in your kitchen and bathrooms whenever cooking and showering. Open windows when the weather permits.
- **Control moisture.** Mold is major indoor allergen. Keep firewood outdoors. It releases moisture in the warm indoor environment.
