Dear Colleagues:

Welcome to the 2015 New Jersey Child Support Conference, our annual opportunity to connect and reflect on the challenges we encountered and the goals we achieved during the past year. But the conference is more than just a celebration of past accomplishments. It also provides us the chance to collaborate on creative strategies to best serve the constantly changing needs of our customers and, through that synergy, to propel the Child Support Program to even greater levels of service and performance.

Last year the CSHOs heard nearly 90,000 matters involving support order establishment, modification and enforcement, providing families with access to justice while saving substantial and invaluable bench time.

We wish the best to those who have moved on, congratulate those who have assumed these important roles, and look forward to new possibilities, approaches, and initiatives.





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

But our words are just a small part of the messages we send - actually, a very small part. You must listen to the non-verbal message as well as the verbal. Much of our perceptions about others is based in these "silent signals."

While we are aware of our words, and choose them with care and precision, we are not always quite so in tune with the non-verbal messages we are sending. And while we may subconsciously aware read the non-verbal messages that others send out, we may not process them on a conscious level and integrate them into the overall message.
