

Kitchen Remodel Cost Guide

3 Methods of determining budget inclusions and allocations.

Regardless of your budget, there are always options and various levels of remodeling that can be done to transform your space into your dream kitchen. Discover what inclusions are associated with different budgets.

Introduction: How Much Does a Kitchen Remodel Cost?

The number one item, making the top of the list to be remodeled, is the kitchen. Homeowners across the United States are asking the question "How much does a kitchen remodel cost?" and wanting an answer. This is a quick and easy question to ask, but a harder question to answer without first gathering all of the details. There are multiple variables when figuring the cost of today's kitchen renovation projects. As a result, we can only attempt to answer this question by providing These averages vary due to several factors ranging from the averages. geographical location to the material selections, from the size of the kitchen to the age of the house. Every kitchen remodel is unique and therefore can only be priced after a jobsite assessment has taken place by a professional kitchen designer or general contractor. Regardless, homeowners still want some type of figure that can help them decide if they are going to undertake a kitchen renovation today, scale back or possibly apply for a loan.

National Averages

For the purpose of providing an answer to this question, let's work under a few assumptions:

- The homeowner will work with a kitchen designer / general contractor. In other words, the labor from start to finish will be hired out. Not a do-ityourself type of project.
- 2) Material selections are midrange.
- 3) The average kitchen space is approximately 200 square feet.

According to the Remodeling 2013 Cost vs. Value Report (<u>www.costvsvalue.com</u>), "minor kitchen remodels" that include new cabinet fronts, laminate countertops, a couple new appliances and hardware have an average national cost of approximately \$20,000.00 and get a 75% return on investment (ROI). A minor kitchen remodel can be looked at as a facelift providing minimal updating but a refreshed look and feel. However, be cognoscente to the concept of being able to discern if indeed this is a benefit or simply a "bandaid." A minor kitchen remodel typically will consist of maintaining the same foot-print and the soffits in order to keep the labor costs down. Minor Kitchen Remodel:



A "major kitchen remodel", which includes new semi-custom cabinets, laminate countertops, most appliances, lighting, and flooring has a national average of approximately \$55,000.00 and a 69% ROI. A major kitchen remodel can really improve the functionality and feel of the space for years to come. Taking out soffits alone can make or break an updated result. Don't consider leaving the soffits to save minimally now, when you may regret it down the road. Within a major kitchen remodel there may be some minor relocations and modifications to the existing footprint.

Major Kitchen Remodel:



An "upscale kitchen" renovation including custom cabinetry, granite countertops, appliances, lighting, flooring and a tiled backsplash can easily cost \$100,000.00 or more. The options and possibilities with an upscale kitchen are endless. Custom cabinetry will provide the versatility and the originality that will define each unique kitchen space. Walls may be removed to provide an open feel in addition to new windows or doors being relocated or modified.

Upscale Kitchen Remodel:



To demonstrate the weight that the geographical factor can play in kitchen prices, the averages for the same three scenarios mentioned above for the Chicago land area increase on average by approximately 15% putting the correlated values at \$22,000.00 for a "minor kitchen" remodel, \$63,000.00 for a "major kitchen" remodel and \$120,000.00 for an "upscale kitchen". The 10% Rule

Another way to estimate what a kitchen remodel will cost or how to align an appropriate budget to your renovation is to use the 10% rule. Basically, this rule states that your kitchen renovation should cost at least 10% of the <u>value of your</u> <u>home</u>. Therefore if you are living in a \$500,000.00 house then you could expect to allocate at least \$50,000.00 on your kitchen project versus a million dollar home where you could expect to spend at least \$100,000.00 on the remodeling of the kitchen.

Proportionately speaking, the more expensive the home typically implies the larger the space. Not only will the space be larger, but the material selections are at a larger scale and high end. There are more bells and whistles. The bottom line is that regardless the value of the home, there is a dream kitchen out there for everyone. Represented below are the categorizations of budget differentials depicted by what standard materials would be expected for a complete kitchen remodel at that price point.

Budget Allocation

When setting a budget, sometimes it makes sense to work backwards. The <u>National Kitchen and Bath Association</u> provided national percentages to help determine what portion of your budget should be allocated to specific materials and to labor. As mentioned earlier, there are several factors that influence the accuracy of these percentages. They range from the geographical location in which your project will be taking place, the quality of materials being selected, the age of your home, the extent of relocating appliances or to what degree the reconfiguring will be taking place and so on. That being said, below are rough percentages you can use as a guide when determining a <u>kitchen budget</u>.

Example demonstrating a \$50,000.00 budget.
