Peach	2-3	8-12ft Circle
Plum	1-3	8-12ft Circle

## Fruit Trees in Containers

Dwarfing Fruit trees can do well in containers. They will not perform as well as in the ground, but with proper pruning they will produce and bear fruit for many years to come. Let us know if you would like to grow fruit in containers due to contaminated soil or lack of growing space.
