# Grant Will Fund Residential Addiction Recovery Scholarships for Residents of Greater Minnesota

(Dec 11, 2014) - <u>The Retreat</u>, which provides residential recovery services for individuals, families and communities affected by drug and alcohol dependency, received a \$250,000 grant from the Otto Bremer Foundation. The grant will provide scholarships to residents of Greater Minnesota providing access to The Retreat's effective residential program for addiction recovery.

Its high-outcome methods have been studied and replicated across the country and around the world. With this scholarship grant, The Retreat will be able offer the hand of affordable recovery to its own back yard, Greater Minnesota.

A 30-day residential stay at The Retreat costs \$4,700; conventional treatment can cost upwards of \$30,000 to \$50,000. This scholarship gift from the Otto Bremer Foundation is thus a highly cost-effective way of addressing the problem of addiction across the state of Minnesota.
