Fun Facts About Elvis

While fans may always remember him as a youthful heartthrob, Elvis Presley would have celebrated his 80th birthday on Jan. 8. To mark this milestone, here's some trivia about the entertainer known as the King of Rock and Roll.

He was a twin. Elvis' twin brother, Jesse Garon Presley, died at birth. His mother, Gladys, claimed that because of this, Elvis had the energy of two people.

Elvis as Tony? Film director Robert Wise originally wanted Elvis to star as Tony, the male lead in the hit musical "West Side Story." But Colonel Tom Parker, Elvis' business manager, felt the role wasn't right for the star.

He pitched one product. Though his likeness has been used in countless ads and promotions, Elvis himself made just one product commercial during his entire career. In 1954, he recorded a radio jingle for Southern Maid Donuts, a

favorite of the King.

He had presidential DNA. Various genealogy studies show Elvis was distantly related to two U.S. presidents, Abraham Lincoln and Jimmy Carter.
