





Habitat Breaks the Cycle of Generational Poverty

Attend a Habitat home dedication and you see joy in the eyes of the children, and optimism in the eyes of the parents. You leave with a sense that things are about to get a little easier, and a lot better, for the family buying the home.

Now, as Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity (TCHFH) celebrates 30 years of work, we are excited to share new, hard evidence that the Habitat model of homeownership is indeed breaking the cycle of generational poverty for families.

The numbers come from Wilder Research, which has been turning out well-respected reports for nearly a century. Wilder worked with Habitat for Humanity Minnesota to survey more than 400 Habitat homeowners all around the state. In many ways, the data confirms what Habitat supporters have always believed in their hearts: Habitat homeownership is linked to greater success in school, improved job opportunities, less reliance on government assistance programs, and dramatic increases in self-esteem. Over the past three decades, thousands of children have benefitted from growing up in safe, decent, affordable Habitat homes in the Twin Cities. The question of "How can we ensure that even more children have this same opportunity in the future?" is the driving force behind a new strategic plan that is being developed to guide TCHFH's work through 2020.

Thank you for helping improve the lives of so many families over the past 30 years. Please continue to volunteer time, donate money, and advocate for the

For 40 years, Sue Haigh has held many important jobs related to planning and creating affordable housing in the Twin Cities.

In April, just as the first home foundations of spring are being poured, Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity will mark 30 years as an organization. This milestone has me joyfully reflecting on all the families, and all the children, who are better off today because of

the countless volunteers and the generous financial donors who've supported this mission for three decades. It's so rewarding to hear people who've owned their Habitat home for years confirm that our work is indeed helping break the cycle of generational poverty.

We are looking ahead to a busy summer build season and a chance to continue living our values of community, integrity, and putting faith into action. Volunteer crews will soon be working on the first of 33 Habitat townhomes on land donated to us in Hugo. Thrivent Financial, which has sponsored and built more Twin Cities Habitat homes than any other group, will help fund eight more homes this year. Several more homes will be going up in the economically challenged pockets of Minneapolis and St. Paul where our work, along with the strength of our families, is helping to stabilize entire neighborhoods.

Unfortunately, the economic landscape for Minnesota families in the bottom half of society remains bleak. Wages aren't

> rising, but housing costs are, and access to financing is extremely limited. This 30th anniversary comes at a fateful moment because, right now, we are hard at work on a new Strategic Plan to guide our efforts through the year 2020.






