## **Listening Script**

Some of the most beautiful rock formations you have ever seen have been carved by the Colorado River for thousands of years. You can hike. You can explore. You can take a mule and go up and down the canyon walls. White water rafting is an especially exquisite way to see it. It's real nature at its best.
