MLP SUCCESS STORY

Helping a single dad pay the bills and care for his sick child

Mr. G, a single dad of an 8-year-old boy newly diagnosed with acute leukemia, was forced to resign from his full-time job in order to be with his son during a bone marrow transplant, which required a lengthy hospitalization. Mr. G's employer had denied his requests to work part-time or to take a temporary leave of absence from work so that he could care for his son during this medically critical time. Mr. G applied for unemployment insurance but his application was denied and the family was launched into a complex and stressful appeal process. A member of the oncology team contacted MLP | Boston to see if the family could get any legal support.

MLP | Boston tapped experienced healthcare lawyer Myra Green to represent Mr. G on a *pro bono* basis at two Division of Unemployment Assistance hearings. Thanks to Mr. G's perseverance and Ms. Green's vigorous advocacy, Mr. G's appeal was ultimately successful. He has been paid \$7,000 in retroactive UI benefits, and will receive future payments to the extent he remains eligible. This victory came just in time to bolster the family's budget as they confront another series of draining daily treatments for Mr. G's son.

Domestic Workers Bill of Rights signed into Law!

Domestic work makes it possible for seniors and people with disabilities to live with dignity at home. Domestic workers make it possible for many busy families to provide safe, reliable care for vulnerable loved ones. Many patient-families treated at our partner healthcare sites are headed by women employed as personal care attendants and nannies, but up until now they've done so with almost no labor or non-discrimination protections. Thanks to the [Massachusetts Domestic Workers Bill of Rights](#), signed by Governor Patrick in July, things have changed. [Your patients – or your patient's parents, guardians, or caregivers – may have new rights under this law.](#) Keep this in mind to the extent your patient is reporting concerns about her ability to access medical care (or maternity leave) and keep her job in a domestic work context.
