




COMMUNITY BENEFIT REPORT



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This fourth edition of Mission in Motion is designed to summarize the community benefits provided by Presbyterian Senior Living at its various locations in Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, and Southeastern Ohio. Presbyterian Senior Living has a long history of providing for seniors with limited resources. The words of the original purpose from the articles of incorporation still apply – "to alleviate the distress and hardship of the aging".

At the time of our founding in 1927 there were no government sponsored programs to meet the needs of seniors, so the entirety of PSL's ministry was funded by contributions. Over the years as the range of services has expanded and the ministry has grown we have continued to focus on serving persons with limited means, often accessing public sources of support to augment charitable dollars. But the heart of what we do is played out in the lives of the growing number of people we serve every day.

This report also includes a variety of other activities that we describe as "community benefit". So in addition to the number of persons served who require subsidy or charitable support we will focus on:

- Education and Training On-site educational offerings extended to the wider community, often in conjunction with other community groups.
- Community Outreach Programs, both on-site and in conjunction with local schools, churches, senior centers, and other community venues.
- Resident and Staff Volunteer Efforts The entire PSL family is engaged in volunteer service to help their neighbors and improve their communities.
- Civic Engagement Participate in civic activities that foster awareness of issues that affect the community and provide direct assistance in solving problems as they are identified.
- Paying Taxes Even though PSL is legally exempt from many forms of taxation as a charitable, tax exempt organization, PSL pays over \$3,547,000 in taxes annually to support the health of the communities in which we reside.
- Employment PSL employs nearly 3,000 individual, supporting families, adding millions of dollars to the economic vitality of the community.

While it is our intention to provide a clear picture of PSL's community benefit profile, we recognize that it is not a complete description, as PSL is a dynamic and constantly evolving ministry. The following pages represent our best effort to provide a snapshot of the heart of PSL.

Community Benefits Category Descriptions

Education and Training

On-site educational offerings extended to the wider community, often in conjunction with other community groups. Educational programs offered include basic life support training, first aid training, successful aging seminars, retirement living programs, veterans education insurance programs, Alzheimer's disease, hospice care, Medicare D sessions, and safe driving to list a few. Colleges and universities utilize our communities for nursing clinical rotations, social work, gerontology, and food and nutrition programs. Lectures are offered by community staff or in partnership with local community leaders. Residents provide mentoring programs for school children assisting with homework and or reading programs.

Community Outreach and Engagement

Presbyterian Senior Living offers a wide variety of outreach programs both on-site and in the external community. The outreach programs provide information and support to community members and in partnership with community organizations. The outreach programs may be offered in local schools, churches, senior centers, or in our PSL communities. The offerings include community health fairs, relay for life, on-site meeting rooms for various community agencies including the Alzheimer's' Association, American Red Cross, boy and girl scout troops, Salvation Army, Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis, Rotary, Red Cross Blood drives, and after school programs. PSL facilities are a significant part of






the community where each facility is located. Civic Engagement involves participation and contribution to civic and public life through staying politically informed, and engaging in community service.

Resident and Staff Volunteer

Both employees and residents have a long history of their commitment to volunteering. Residents move to our communities with a rich profile of their volunteer efforts and they continue to support volunteerism in our facilities. Also, residents volunteer in their local churches, community organizations, local schools, community thrift shop, fund raising projects, hospitals, and other programs of interest. Staff provide volunteer public education programs, leaders in community organizations and professional organizations, community gardens, Salvation Army, Kiwanis, community auxiliary members, pee wee soccer, hosting an international family, Caring Casseroles for shutins, Chamber of Commerce, Christmas bazaar, assist handicap citizens to grocery shopping, and serving as a Sunday school teacher.

Presbyterian Senior Living (PSL) Administrative Office is located in Dillsburg, Pennsylvania. It is the nexus for communications and administrative oversight of all PSL communities located in Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and southeastern Ohio. PSL is governed by a volunteer board of trustees. An important task for the board is to ensure that all programs and services for all communities fulfill the PSL mission statement. The PSL workforce is encouraged to be responsible citizens and work toward creating a better community and world.

Staff volunteer hours are dedicated to churches, schools, soup kitchens, homeless shelters, Harrisburg Humane Society, and in Lancaster County the Coalition for Smart Growth and the Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee. Staff volunteers working in their hometowns are involved with parent teacher associations, public and private school sports teams, school board sponsored functions, scouting organizations, and support for local civic and service organizations.

The PSL Learning Center, a state of the art suite, is used by other not-for-profit organizations for meetings and educational and training programs. Organizations using the learning center during the past year including the following: Monaghan Presbyterian Church, Vistage, PANAC board meetings, and the LeadingAge PA Fellows in Leadership program. The learning center is also used on a regular basis for staff training and a host of special events.

Two special groups that receive support from the administrative office are Forgotten Voices International (www.forgottenvoices.org.), a group that provides support to children orphaned by AIDS in Zimbabwe and Zambia. FVI occupies office space in the historic farm house on the Carroll Village campus (provided free of charge) and support their activities in a variety of ways, including sponsorship of the annual FVI 5 K run, and the Party by the Pond fundraising event. The value of the office space and support is in excess of \$25,000 per year, with an additional \$25,000 to 30,000 per year in cash contributions from PSL staff members.

In addition, PSL provides support to Govans Ecumenical Development Corporation (GEDCO) in excess of \$50,000 per year. In addition to their work with seniors, they support a variety of programs that serve the needs of the severely disadvantaged in the Baltimore area. PSL has been working with GEDCO for over 20 years. The range of their activities is listed on the GECCO website at www.gedco.org.

The Administrative Office also sponsors the Caring Community Fund at Each PSL location, providing assistance to employees and their families in times of unexpected hardship.



Cathedral Village

Joining in 2015, residents, volunteers and staff were busy with numerous activities which impacted resident enhancement and community outreach.

Throughout the year, several activities are planned and held in conjunction with the St. Mary's Church – Les Petit Cherubs Preschool. Such as an Easter egg hunt, Halloween parade and use of Cathedral Hall for concerts and events.

Other school aged children's activities include: Reading Buddies at Shawmont Elementary School, students read one on one with a resident; residents tutor them. Residents also helped paint Thomas Mifflin Elementary School.

Members of the Fiber Arts Group mend uniforms for St. James School students and knit and crochet hats for the Community Partnership School. Also, the group makes summer dresses and shorts for children at an orphanage in Haiti.

In addition, residents and staff hold food drives, collect and donate turkeys and used furniture and clothing to support local homeless shelters.

Outside groups that utilize space at Cathedral Village include: the Succulent Society, African Violet Society, Garden Club of Philadelphia, Roxborough Coin Club, Equine Society, Orchid Society, Knitting Guild, Delaware Valley Opera Company and many more.


The Easton Home

The staff and residents of The Easton Home are actively engaged in the community. Every holiday the residents create cards to include in a basket of necessary items for the local Meals on Wheels program. The residents collect used children's books, clean them up and label them to donate them to the Cops and Kids Reading Room of the Easton Partnership. In 2015, 16 boxes of toys, toiletries, clothes and other items were collected and donated to the Holiday Hope Chest drive. Also, used and new coats, mittens, hats and scarves were collected – seven bags – for the homeless shelter, Safe Harbor.

On a regular basis, local community groups utilize space at no charge in The Easton Home for meetings and activities. These groups include: Greater Easton Area Democratic Women, Daughters of American Revolution, West Ward Business Roundtable, West Ward Block Watch, Easton Weyerbacher Wednesday,

Green Ridge Village

During 2015, Green Ridge Village provided over 320 hours of education, training and support to LPN students in Franklin County. Also, Alzheimer's education was offered on the campus and at the Big Spring Senior Center.

Green Ridge personal care residents made fleece blankets as gifts for patients in the Hershey Medical Center Children's Hospital and the Walter Reed Wounded Soldiers program. Residents are very active volunteering on the campus, including: hosting bingo, resident transportation to the beauty shop, working in the Thrift and Gift Shops, singing in the Village Aires, sharing other musical talents with residents in personal care and memory support, working in the model railroad building, the Woodworkers, and the GRV Gardening Club.

Residents and staff are active in the community off campus as well including, the Alzheimer's Association, community Easter Egg Hunt, Meals on Wheels, Project Share, Salvation Army, John Graham library, churches, Chambersburg Hospital, Big Spring Watershed Association and the Bluebird Society of PA.

There are many community groups that use meeting space on the campus. They include: the Lions Club, EMS providers, Big Spring Watershed Association, and the Big Spring Inter-Church Council.

Glen Meadows Retirement Community

The Food Bank benefits from the efforts of the entire community to collect non-perishable food items throughout the year for families in need. Six Baltimore area hospital neonatal departments received four large boxes of tiny knitted hats and blankets created by resident knitters in the 'Care Ware Club'. 'Blankets for Warriors' is a blanket making group of residents and team members creating warm, comfort blankets for women receiving cancer treatment.

Glen Meadows partners with Victory Villa Elementary School, which is a school with children and families who are economically challenged. Everyone at Glen Meadows gets involved to collect boxes of school supplies to be delivered to the children for a successful start to the school year! Also, 'Mitten Trees' (Christmas Trees set up throughout the

community), resulted in the collection of four large totes of mittens, hats and winter wear to keep the Victory Villa children warm.

Other Outreach efforts included selling red and pink carnations for The American Heart Association and participation in the annual Breast Cancer Awareness

walk in October.

Kirkland Village

The residents and staff of Kirkland Village in Bethlehem have continued their focus on community engagement by supporting local organizations through the donation of meeting space and ancillary support for events and programs. In 2015, the long-time partnership with the YWCA of Bethlehem was expanded by introducing Dinner Dialogues, which feature open discussions about diversity, as it relates to current events and issues relevant in today's society. Additionally, Kirkland Village's Diversity Committee partnered with the Racial Justice Coalition to host a first-time, very successful fundraiser; the effects of which will be felt for years to come by area children and young adults through the educational programming of the YWCA.

These events were welcome additions to the ever popular Great Decisions Foreign Affairs Lecture Series, which Kirkland Village has been hosting for 11 years. The purpose of the series, also sponsored by the YWCA, is to educate people about important issues relating to American foreign policy. The Bethlehem Great Decisions group is the only Great Decisions group in the Lehigh Valley and features local experts. One resident and one staff member from Kirkland Village also serve as Great Decisions Committee Members.

A significant impact is made by staff who volunteer in their neighborhoods, churches, schools, and civic organizations including Knights of Columbus, scouting groups, International Rotary, and the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce.



Presbyterian Village at Hollidaysburg

The Presbyterian Village at Hollidaysburg provides outreach and support services for individuals throughout the Hollidaysburg/Altoona area through staff and resident involvement. Meeting space is offered to community groups and organizations for their meetings and events. Staff and residents support the community through events such as, St. Vincent DePaul Society, SPCA, Meals on Wheels, local churches, the American Red Cross blood drive, and by offering a safe trick or treat event and Easter egg hunt each year.

The Presbyterian Village is a training site for nursing students and interns from various disciplines from Penn State (main campus), Penn State Altoona campus, the greater Altoona Career and Technology Center, and Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

A fun, yet meaningful, Red Nose event was held where individuals purchased red noses to wear and donated food to the St. Vincent DePaul food bank. Another collaborative effort was the Treasures for Children held at the Salvation Army. More than 50 children received gifts from the donations made by residents, employees and visitors. Terry Garlick, a nurse aide, coordinates an Easter Egg Hunt for neighborhood and campus-related children. When asked why she does it, she said, "I love the opportunity to mix generations, the old and the young, both celebrating the coming of spring."

Quincy Village

Educational and training opportunities abound throughout the year at Quincy Village. Residents from all levels of living, employees and others including students at Penn State Mont Alto benefit from these programs. The programs offered in 2015 include: AARP Safe Driving course, tax preparation, the downsizing process, history sessions, culinary preparation/healthy options, estate planning, and making adaptive devices for health center residents.

Quincy Village is the site for meetings of community groups. Space is made available at no charge to the Lions Club, an Alzheimer's support group, and a state retiree's group.

Over 30 walkers participated in Franklin County's Alzheimer Association Walk. The group raised over \$4,000 with their efforts. One resident shares her musical talent as a harpist to offer healing with music and teaches others about it.

Residents and staff are active in the community in many ways. One independent living resident recruited others to help go to local orchards/gardens and pick or collect fruits and vegetables to deliver to area food banks.

Members of the Quincy Needlers knitted over 1,000 sweaters and donated them to the World Vision Knit for Kids project.

Over 30 residents, one employee and some family members are involved in this project.

St. Andrew's Village

Throughout 2015, there were many activities organized with the residents and employees of St. Andrew's Village engaged in the community at-large. Residents of the health center collected items to fill shoe boxes for children under the age of 10 years old. They even used one of their favorite activities – bingo – to win prizes that they could add to the shoe boxes.

Personal care residents help at a local church on a regular basis. They sing in the Gracedale Presbyterian Church choir and distribute bulletins before the service starts.

Residents collected dog and cat food and snack items for the local Humane Society. A group of children visit monthly, LEAP kids – Linking Elders and Preschoolers program – to crafts and learn from one another.

Many community groups use space at St. Andrew's Village for meetings or activities such as, boy and girl scout troops and Great Decisions – an IUP Adult Education program. Students from IUP and the Indiana County Technological School use St. Andrew's as a training site. Also, members from a variety of groups visit St. Andrew's residents to interact or share activities.

These include: Summit Church, IUP students, and school aged students with Autism.

Ware Presbyterian Village

Ware Presbyterian Village is home to active independent living residents, personal care residents and those in the health center requiring additional services. In addition to serving the needs of its residents, the Aquatic Fitness Center is available to members of the Oxford Senior Center at a discounted rate. In 2015, there were 81 individuals participating in the fitness programming.

The Ware dining team with Sodexho participates in the Meals on Wheels program. Ware prepares and packages an average of 39 meals daily and volunteers pick up the meals for delivery to homebound seniors in the Oxford area.

Residents of Ware are actively engaged in community organizations. Some include: area churches, tutoring students at Downs Elementary School, preparing evening meals at the

Lighthouse for area youth, Oxford Library, Elkridge School, Jennersville Hospital and the Art Alliance Club.

Employees support the community by volunteering with: Safe Harbor, Animal Rescue, Christian Motorcycle Association, United Way, scout groups, local ambulance and fire companies,

homeless shelter, YMCA and school parent teacher organizations.

Meeting space is available to community groups at no charge.

Masterpiece Living assists retirement communities in providing a balance of Spiritual, Intellectual, Physical and Social opportunities through incorporating the involvement of its diverse Human Capital, its staff and residents.

Volunteerism is alive as a large percentage of residents volunteer their time and talents on and off campus. Whether it's the Village Thrift Shop, which is open to the community at large or the campus Gift Shop resident volunteers work hand and hand with proceeds to support benevolent care needs. In 2015 over 900 volunteer hours were accrued in such areas as visitation, school based mentoring, performing arts and veteran organizations.

Westminster Woods

In 2015, a collaborative effort made a big impact – internationally! The Walk to Wellness was held at Westminster Woods with the focus on outreach to a local soldier from Huntingdon and his platoon who were serving overseas in Afghanistan. The residents pulled together and sent 15 boxes of toiletries and supplies to the platoon. Sixty-eight residents and 26 employees put on pedometers and walked to "Afghanistan" as a symbolic gesture. Residents walked 7,180,595 steps. Staff walked 7,687,782 steps. The steps logged totaled 7,434 miles.

Other resident activities included: a fundraiser to support the purchase of underwater cameras for search and rescue efforts in the Huntingdon area, two residents facilitate an Alzheimer's Association support group, volunteering at a local soup kitchen, Meals on Wheels delivery, transportation scheduling for local VA clinic, volunteering at St. Vincent DePaul Society, and help at Juniata College student recruitment fairs. During Lent, personal care residents wrap utensils for the Catholic Churches Friday Night Lenten dinners.

Community groups interact with residents in a variety of ways. Students from local high schools volunteer at the health center and personal care while learning valuable life and social skills. Juniata College students spend time with residents in a mentor-type relationship. Also, a Juniata College pre-med student conducted a study with eight independent living residents related to memory and music.
