POA did what we needed to do. We made certain the POA funds were safe and accounted for. We supported the workers who faced daunting pressure to not file claims on their unpaid Social Security, Health Insurance and other employer-paid benefits. POA, GP and Patrick Hiebert provided bus transportation into Managua, counsel and support, time off and lunches so that these men had the confidence to appear and make their cases known before the government agency that handles employer/employee matters. The workers agreed to continue working despite the lack of clarity as to who was their employer. Together we all held hands and crossed the flood waters!

My comments would be incomplete if I did not celebrate the efforts of Patrick, and his tireless assistant, Angela Smetana. Despite the fact Patrick was personally financially affected, he quickly determined the best way to push back was to step forward. Clearly declaring that he was representing only himself as an individual, Patrick moved from Canada to Gran Pacifica within days of the news. He self-funded operations and payrolls. He worked with little sleep and struggled through confusion for weeks. Together we – all of us, GP, Patrick, POA and the respective staffs - worked to assure this unsettling period was as operationally seamless as possible for owners, residents, guests – and employees. The difference is that Patrick is at ground zero. He is immersed in the daily problems 24/7. Because of his efforts, events planned at the property long before this happened, have come off without a hitch (well, maybe little ones!). Thank You, Patrick for a Job Well Done!

FUTURE MEDICAL/DENTAL CLINIC JUST OUTSIDE GRAN PACIFICA'S GATE

MEDICAL/DENTAL CLINIC

When Patrick revealed this heart wrenching story, I knew it had to get out to the residents of Gran Pacifica.

One day, while I was driving along a country dirt road, transporting volunteers to where we were rebuilding a school in Villa El Carmen, the clutch on the van burnt out. We managed to get a ride for the others but I stayed with the van until the tow truck came. While I was waiting, I noticed a little boy watching me from the bushes. He was tossing a baseball in the air so I waved him over to play catch with me. It didn't take long to realize that even at 10 years old, he was much better than me, and he laughed at how acrobatic he had to be to catch my throws! He made me laugh ... but then I noticed his throwing style was strange.

When he came closer, it was clear why that was. His arm was at a 45 degree angle between his wrist and elbow. I asked him what happened, and he said he'd fallen out of a tree. So, I asked, "And the doctors let it heal like that?!"

He looked at me like I had two heads. "Doctors?" was all he said.

It hit me hard imagining the pain that little boy must have endured sleeping through many nights with his badly broken arm untreated with no pain killers. These beautiful and promising children in Nicaragua have no access to health care and can't even get a broken arm fixed properly. My own daughter had fallen out of "monkey bars" on a playground and her arm had looked the same, and she cried and cried because it hurt so badly, then two hours later pain medication helped her settle down and her arm was straight again and in a cast. This little boy's parents just wrapped his fractured arm up in cloth, and I could picture his mother holding him as he sobbed for many nights while he went through the pain of both bones in his forearm being snapped and healing crookedly without any pain medication at all. His parents couldn't afford the ride to the hospital or the fees for the care. And unfortunately, the sorrowful day didn't end there.

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Later that evening, back in the comfort of one of the Las Perlas condos at Gran Pacifica, I had gotten a message from a friend that one of the brightest eight year old boys in school named Francesco had not been to classes for a few days. Everyone believed he just had a flu. I was horrified to learn that Francesco had died of pneumonia simply because his parents could not afford to bring him to the hospital or pay for the simple treatment that would have saved his life. For a few dollars, this boy's life could have been saved. Anyone of us would have gladly brought him to the hospital if we had known the situation.

It immediately became very clear to me. We need to build a medical clinic—a medical-dental clinic where parents know they can bring their children and they will be cared for at no cost. This clinic is the current big project undertaking by Help Them Help Themselves.

SURFING IN NICARAGUA



SURFING IN GRAN PACIFICA

Super surfing in Nicarauga was a hidden treasure until a little over a decade ago when, after the new democracy, locals who had been surfing in Florida began returning from their self-imposed exhile.

Now, it is well known that Nicaragua, especially the southwestern parts of the coastline has some of the best surfing in the world. I am a four year old when it comes to surfing, but I'm learning. Sitting on the grass near the beach, I watch the surfers as they paddle and peer toward the horizon, looking for the big wave that is going to come close enough to shore before it breaks, and big enough to get into the 'tube.' That, someone explained to me, is the hollow space the waves creates as it breaks. Many times I see the experienced surfers gliding with the waves through that tube with such grace and synchrony, they seem to become part of the the undulating ocean. Come to think of it, if there is no synchrony, there is no riding of a wave.

In this Southwest corner of Nicaragua, the temperatur of the water varies from 21 to 31 degrees Celsius. The temperature, location and geographic logistics are what make this part of the coast-line so desirable.

This time of year, swells aren't as big, but there is a good supply of off shore wind that, I learned, helps the waves increase in height. A narrow stretch of coastline separates Lake Nicaragua (the largest lake in Central America) from the Pacific Ocean. The huge body of water creates atmospheric conditions causing winds to blow off shore most of the year. There seems to be no "off-season" for surfers. In Gran Pacifica, some of the surfers stay all year long, or they have property and home they come to parts of the year.

I may get my nerve up and give it a try. I figure if I can ride a Harley Davidson over 20,000 miles, I should be able to ride a wave for a quarter of a mile.
