However, you can rest assured that only the design has changed, the high quality content that you expect from TiBS will remain unaltered. As mentioned by Sydney Brenner in our December Special Issue, and as outlined in the next editorial by Jan Witkowski, biochemistry is making a come back (did it ever go away?), and so the future for *TiBS* is bright. At a time when the generation of biochemical data and information is unprecedented, TiBS will strive to keep you up to date, while continuing to provide a platform for hypothesis and discussion. In a nutshell, the goal of *TiBS* is to deliver the best research reviews written by the best scientists.

The aim of the new design is to make the content of the journal more accessible (both in print and online). So, TiBS has been divided into five separate sections -**Research Update, News & Comment,** Opinion, Review and Forum - each of which incorporate several different types of article. We have also taken this opportunity to re-name some of the article types; for example, Frontlines articles are now called Research News, and Talking Points have become Opinion articles. As you might have noticed from the contents page, we have also introduced two new article types - In Brief and Q & A - to compliment the indepth mini-reviews for which *TiBS* is well known. In Brief articles are snippets of



biochemical news that will keep you informed about the latest in research, policy and education. These articles are complied by three outside editors, Stephanie and Bernard de Bono and Andrea Rinaldi. The **Q & As**, made accessible by the question and answer format, outline the essential points of a research topic. This January issue contains both **In Brief** and **Q & A** articles, so please take a look and let me know what you think. To help orientate you with respect to the new format, a brief synopsis of the contents is given below.

Research Update

This section contains three article types: **Research News** provides an in-depth discussion on recent research papers, **Meeting Reports** give highlights of relevant conferences, and **Protein Sequence Motif** articles describe new and biochemically relevant protein domains.

News & Comment

This section includes **Journal Club**, which comprises short articles, written by scientists, commenting on the latest research papers; the **In Brief** section highlighting the latest biochemical news, policy and educational issues; and finally **Letters**, which are written by scientists to stimulate debate.

Opinion

The **Opinion** section is an integral part of the journal that gives you the opportunity to propose new ideas, challenge existing models and contribute to stimulating debates.

Review

Reviews provide the backbone of each issue and are the hallmark of *TiBS*. The subject matter covered by these articles aims to provide a full breadth of coverage across all areas of biochemistry and molecular biology.

Forum

This section includes the popular features of *TiBS* such as **Computer Corner**, **Book Reviews** and **Historical Perspective**, and now also the new **Q & A** articles.
