A ROAD TO INDEPENDENCE

Mareny was 16 years old when the Department of Children and Family Services removed her from her parents' care. Placed immediately with a gualified foster family, Mareny — like many children in the system — internalized her history of abuse. She began to hurt herself and have suicidal thoughts. Recognizing that Mareny was in danger, her foster family contacted county personnel and she was immediately hospitalized. After 30 days, Mareny was discharged. Stable but extremely vulnerable, Mareny's feelings of uncertainty were heightened when she was told that returning to her original foster family was not an option because they were not trained to deal with her level of trauma. Mareny was told that she needed to be placed in a residential treatment facility, but she had no idea what that meant.

Arriving at Maryvale, Mareny felt alone. But, over time, Mareny began to form the relationships that would shift her view of the world from a volatile place where she was in danger, to a stable place where she was loved and accepted. Mareny began to see Maryvale as her home; the staff and other girls became her family. When Mareny turned 18, she — like 65% of youth released from foster care — "aged-out" of the Foster Care system with nowhere to go. Moving Mareny into its Transitional Housing and After Care program, Maryvale ensured that Mareny would be given all the tools she needed for a peaceful transition to independence.

For the past year, Mareny has paid rent for a furnished apartment. Mareny's rent is deposited into a savings account and will be given to her when she successfully

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completes the program; the money can then be used to make a deposit on a real-world apartment. Mareny receives Mental Health services, life-skills training, and guidance and support from counselors and peers.

Today, Mareny's smile lights up a room. She laughs easily and often, and looks forward to a bright future. She attends Pasadena City College, studies child development, works as a teacher's aide at Maryvale's Early Education Center, and recently

purchased her first car. Mareny credits Maryvale with helping her become the stable and independent adult she is today.



EMERGENCY SHELTER CARE

For a child, being removed from their parents – regardless of the presence of abuse or neglect – is an exceptionally frightening experience. Maryvale recently responded to a crisis in Los Angeles County by agreeing to open an emergency shelter care program for children 6-12 just removed from their homes due to abuse, neglect or other traumatic experiences. This temporary, short-term (typically 30 days) shelter will meet the therapeutic needs of children





including immediate medical attention and educational and social-emotional assessments. These assessments help Child Protective Services and the dependency court make optimum decisions for the child's future care, ensuring each child is matched with a nurturing setting that has the capacity to provide care that meets their unique needs.

Maryvale is blessed to have the facilities and experience necessary to meet this critical need. We ask that you keep our efforts in your prayers as we work to bring God's healing power to these vulnerable children.
