Stonehill College Service Corps



We are blessed again this year to welcome another member of the Stonehill College Service Corps: Caroline Cupelo. The Stonehill Service Corps is a postgraduate service experience that puts the college's mission to prepare students for service to the common good and the practice of responsible citizenship into action. Caroline is a recent graduate of Stonehill College and began her eleven-month service experience at HOPe in August. This position has a two pronged focus;

direct care and administrative support. The program assistant directly supports individuals with developmental and other disabilities served through our Adult Services Program. In this role, Caroline will split her time supporting individual client goals and working with the President to improve and/or establish new processes to better serve our growing number of clients.

Internship Programs





The House of Possibilities (HOPe) collaborates with Stonehill College for semester long internships. This fall, fourteen Neuroscience students from Professor Yu's class will intern in HOPe's Adventure Club program. Internships are an integral part of enriching and augmenting each student's educational experience. In the classroom, the students learn about neurological development and disorders. The internship at HOPe requires the students to work with special needs children that attend HOPe's Adventure Club program each Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The students may work directly and indirectly with children with



neurological impairments and other related deficits. Internships have prepared students for post-graduate opportunities leading to career paths in caregiving professions such as Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Speech Therapy and Special Education.
