Why do half of the hospice eligible population not use hospice? There are many reasons: they are scared because of the misconceptions they have about what we do; they are uninformed; they don't know where to turn or how to start; the family thinks they can manage; they don't want to give up because their loved ones may be sad and so many more reasons that we hear all too often.

In the year 2000, 21% of those eligible for this extraordinary compassionate care received it. Today, that number has doubled and almost 50% of those eligible are using hospice but that means that 50% of the population could still benefit from hospice care and they are not. How can we help them understand what you, the members of the Old Colony Hospice family know?



We need your help to share with your family, friends and colleagues that hospice is about living well during a difficult time.

Marilyn, the sister of a patient, writes: "I don't know how the aide managed to care for my brother because his bathroom was so small but she did. She had such a way of kidding him and one day she said something and he told her – 'if you don't behave we may have to fire you'. We all laughed about that for days because we knew that would never happen. Without the aide, the nurses, and the entire Old Colony Hospice team we could not have kept him home and in good spirits – you were a God send."

Ann, the daughter of a patient writes: "Two days before my dad passed he told the nurse 'This is the best medical treatment I have ever had' and we were so happy because he was so happy. We only wish our mom had been cared for by Old Colony Hospice. She did not have the same end of life experience because we didn't know the difference and didn't realize we had a choice."

National Healthcare Decisions Day - April 16, 2015

You or a loved one has been in an accident or fallen ill and cannot communicate your wishes to the treating healthcare providers. What happens next? It is bad enough that you find yourself in this situation but to have not shared what you want with your loved ones if this instance should occur leaves your loved ones, who are so emotionally overwrought without the clear knowledge of your wishes. Don't wait. Take action now. Your decisions matter.

If you are uncomfortable having the face to face conversation write it down, send them an e-mail or tell



them where they can find all of your documents. Be sure to make it easily accessible. Be sure you keep copies too. You could even keep a card in your wallet in the event of an emergency and someone cannot be reached.

All too often, we find ourselves in these unexpected situations (and even the expected ones) where there is no clear information on what to do regarding your healthcare decisions.

Most of us remember the

story of Terri Schiavo which revealed that having an advance directive is so important, regardless of your age or your health situation.

In 1990, Congress passed the Patient Self-Determination Act to give all of us the right put his or her future healthcare wishes in writing with an "advance directive." Estimates suggest that only about 25% of all Americans have done so. Advance directives can be created without a lawyer, for free, relatively easily, and yet 75% of the population is still unprotected. *Are you*?

Free forms from every state are available at www. nationalhealthcaredecisionsday.org along with more information and tools you may need.

You can also visit www. caringinfo.org to understand what the acronyms and terms that you hear in an emergent situation mean: DNR, DNI, CPR, artificial nutrition and hydration, a living will, medical power of attorney more often known as a healthcare proxy.

Don't wait. Take action now. Your decisions matter.

The Prone Family Foundation Helps to Expand Palliative Care

The Prone Family Foundation has generously offered to help Old Colony Hospice and Palliative Care expand our Palliative Care Consultation Service with a challenge gift. The Foundation will match all gifts up to \$12,500 for a total of \$25,000.

These funds will be used to help us bring our Palliative Care Consultation Service into the 5 new towns we are now serving in southeastern Massachusetts including Kingston, Franklin, Wrentham, Plainville and Norfolk.

"We are so grateful to the Prone Family Foundation for becoming a partner with us so that we can improve the quality of life for individuals living with a complex illness "says Toni Eaton, RN, BSN, MS, President and CEO. In 2011, Dr. Diane E. Meier and Rich Umbdenstock, CEO of the American Hospital Association, explained that patients with complex illnesses comprise only 5%-10% of patients, but account for two-thirds of the country's healthcare costs. In spite of this, "these patients and their families report untreated symptoms, unmet needs, high caregiver burden and low satisfaction." This is where Palliative Care comes into play. This number continues to grow as more and more people are faced with complex illnesses and still want to pursue curative treatments and live their lives.

The Old Colony Hospice Palliative Care Team listens to patients so they understand their needs and values and can then tailor their care plan to meet the patient's goals all in conjunction with their existing caregivers including their physician, VNA and home care agencies. Our program aims to:

• Relieve and manage pain and other distressing symptoms

• Minimize hospital visits and re-hospitalization

• Assist with care goals and advance directives

• Eliminate unnecessary medications and the simultaneous use of multiple drugs to treat a single ailment or condition

• Improve patient comfort, dignity, quality of life and outcomes

• Increase understanding of disease process and treatment options.
