One of the most popular activities is the golf tournament on the Homestead's Old Golf Course, which has the distinction of having the nation's oldest tee still in continuous use. Other activities include fly-fishing, canoeing, horseback riding, tennis, paintball, hiking, biking and a gun club. Last year, I went on a fairly easy hike along a rocky riverbed to view cascading waterfalls and then learned with amazement that skeet shooting is not nearly as hard as it looks. If you prefer to do less and relax more, then you could spend the afternoon indulging at the spa or lounging by the pool.

The VLR officially kicks off Friday with the Welcome Reception that evening. The reception boasts delectable heavy hors d'oeuvres, fun networking and live entertainment. Saturday is the "meat" of the event, with the bulk of the educational sessions and the Legal and Legislative Update. Business partners have the opportunity to exhibit during the day Saturday so that all attending can meet them if they have not yet had the chance. Saturday evening always holds a wonderful dinner reception with cocktail hour, live entertainment and a menu only a James Beard award winner could produce. Then, it's rise and shine for round two of the educational sessions. which continue Sunday. The event comes to a close just before lunch. By the time the weekend is over, you will have earned eight hours of continuing education credits toward CAI manager designations without even realizing it.

I can't say enough good things about the VLR or The Homestead. The event offers advanced education on the state level at a very reasonable cost. And networking with other industry professionals for three days in a beautiful setting with no shortage of fun activities, great food and a few cocktails is an opportunity that you just don't get at a trade show or committee meeting. The resort itself is absolutely charming. The breakfast buffet is an event in itself and the nostalgia of the traditional afternoon tea is a lost art.
