She recalls the thrill she felt even as a young child looking back at the city from the Algiers side of the Batchure to see the illuminated steeple of St. Louis Cathedral.

She was educated at the Academy of the Holy Angels, a parochial school for girls only, housed in a building that had been used during the Civil War as barracks by Confederate soldiers. The teachers were of the same order of Maronite nuns as those who had nursed the wounded soldiers in the Infirmary.

After graduation she went to work and then married. Several years later she realized that the marriage was not working out and moved to Houston with her then 4-year old daughter to get a fresh start.

The burgeoning medical community in Houston provided an ideal environment for her business skills combined with her quiet behind-the-scenes efficiency and people skills, and here she found an ideal career as Medical Staff Coordinator, helping doctors staff, set up insurance and other systems, and manage their offices.

When two young neurologists left Baylor for private practice together they asked Aimee to come with them select nurses and set up all the insurance systems and patient records. She says they were brilliant specialists but so young that she sometimes felt almost like a baby-sitter as she supplemented their medical expertise with some sound management principles of which they knew very little if anything.

After eleven years with them she felt ready for retirement, but after retiring she was restless within a short time. She knew that she did not want to go back to the heavy responsibilities and rigorous schedules of managing a medical practice, but she was not quite sure what she wanted to do. For starters she hit on the idea of doing some volunteer work to find her passion for this time of her life.
