


MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: JOANNE DRISCOLL

Most people who come to Treemont walk into the independent living section and settle in, confident that if and when they need assisted living, skilled nursing care, or nursing home care they can get it right on the same tree-shaded nine-acre campus that has become home to them.

For newcomer Joanne Driscoll, however, the procedure was reversed. As soon as both children were in school, however, she was ready for a bigger market and became a “headhunter.”

In case you’re not familiar with the term, a headhunter in today’s English is an executive search expert who recruits specialists to fill a certain niche in a corporation, usually at \$200,000 a year or more.
