Geometric measurement: understand concepts of volume and relate volume to multiplication and to addition.

- 3. Recognize volume as an attribute of solid figures and understand concepts of volume measurement.
 - A cube with side length 1 unit, called a "unit cube," is said to have "one cubic unit" of volume, and can be used to measure volume.
 - A solid figure which can be packed without gaps or overlaps using n unit cubes is said to have a volume of n cubic units.
