Step 1: A Chat with an American University Professor





What do professors in the United States expect from students? What factors determine a student's success in a course? The answer is probably very different from your home country! Listen to this conversation to find out.



Step 2: Focus on New Phrasal Verbs



To Scare off

Phrasal verb



Meaning: To induce fear in someone or something so that they want to run away or escape a situation

The students were scared off when the professor announced his quiz schedule.

To Jot down

Phrasal verb



Meaning: To quickly write something down on a piece of paper, to take notes

I jotted down a few notes during the lecture at school.

To speak up

Phrasal verb



Meaning: To say something, to voice your opinion without hesitation

If you have an important point to make you need to speak up.

To show up

Phrasal verb




Meaning: To arrive, sometimes unexpectedly

I couldn't believe it when the famous politician showed up at our home.

To break up

Phrasal verb

* note- this phrasal verb has many meanings, this module only looks at one of them



Meaning: To separate a group of people or objects

Our teacher broke us up into groups so that we could work together

To look back on

Phrasal verb




Meaning: To remember or recall a time or situation in the past

I don't want to look back on my twenties and feel disappointed.

O When you were in school, did you jot down notes in a notebook or did you take notes on your laptop? Did teachers mind if you brought your computer to class? Is it important for you to jot down notes in order to remember the material or can you remember just by hearing it? What is your learning style?

A: So I've heard that Psychology 201 with Professor Brown is really tough. If I want to pass, what should I do?

O What do you feel when you look back on your university experience? Was it a good time in your life or a stressful time? Based on what you learned in this module, how do you think the college lifestyle in your country is different from that in the US in terms of where you live, how you study, your daily habits, etc. Looking back on your own college days, would you change anything about your experience in college?

A: (student) Oh I'm so glad we could both make it to the class reunion!

B: I know, can you believe it's been 20 years since we graduated?

A: I can't believe it. _____ (Looking back) on those years, things were so great

B: Yes! And life was easy back in college.

A: I thought that there was so much pressure at the time, but _____ (looking back) it wasn't so bad.

O Do you think that **breaking up** into small groups and having discussions is a good way to learn? Why or why not? Did you **break up** into discussion or work groups in your college classes? What other skills could you gain from this format in addition to the class material?

1. Bonus- Please use the phrases from "Say It Another Way"

A: What was your graduate program like? How did the professor structure the classes?

B: (student) Most of the time there was a lecture and then the professor _____(broke us up into) small groups to discuss the concepts.

A: Oh yeah? And how did you like that style?

B: It really helped me learn. I am glad that the professor _____ (broke us up into) work groups.

A: I bet your classmates challenged your point of view. That's great.

B: Yeah, exactly.

- O What are the top 3 skills that the US education system tries to cultivate in students? How does that compare to your country's education system?
- What skills are not taught in your country's education system? How important are those skills? What is the cost of not learning them? What other countries are learning them?
- O Do you think that study abroad should be a mandatory requirement to graduate from college? Why or why not? How important do you think cross-cultural communication skills are? Why?
- Should students have to pay for college or should it be funded by the state? Does everyone have a right to education? What is the average price of education (tuition) in your country? What are the differences between public and private colleges?

- O Is it common for students to cheat in university classes in your country? How are they disciplined? What are the repercussions?
- What is the attitude toward learning disabilities in your country's university education system? How could this be improved? (*If you don't know what a learning disability is, please read more about this in the materials list)
- What is your personal definition of "intelligence"? Is that the only way to define it? How have other people defined it in the past? Do you agree with these definitions? Why or why not?
- To what extent is intelligence inborn and to what extent can it be cultivated?
