

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## Step 1: What Did You Learn as an American Kid?







Please listen to Audio Step 1- "What Did You Learn as an American Kid?"


## Step 2: Focus on New Vocabulary Expressions





This means to get older and bigger, this can only be used when you talk about children and teenagers, usually under age 18

#### To be equivalent to, to be reduced to, the bottom line

"Success in football comes down to hard work and a little luck."

### To throw around (an idea)

Phrasal verb

#### To casually talk about an idea

"Let's get together later and throw some ideas around for the new project"

Phrasal verb




#### To arrive, to show up, to appear

"Our second child came along two years after our first child."


