




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Step 1: Do You Miss Your Family?








Americans move around the United States all of the time. Find out how Keriann and Francis feel about this and learn about typical American attitudes toward moving away from family.

Step 2: Focus on New Vocabulary Expressions




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
To escape, to physically move away from a person, a place, or a situation

To get older, only used when you talk about children

Where did you grow up?




To get out of bed in the morning

What time did you get up this morning?



To go from one place to another or to relocate one's home from place to place

To be separated from other people by a certain amount of distance

No pun intended

More examples of puns



Here Keriann talks about her observations in Spain, which is a **"foreign"** country

"...they were all going to the same university in the same city and that to me was **foreign**, **no pun intended**, but yeah, they were all just staying right there and they were going to continue living with their parents"

Pun= a form of word play that exploits the double meaning of a word or expression. If you say "no pun intended" it means that you made a pun unintentionally.
