





National Parks

There are more than 2,000 federal recreation sites across the United States and the <u>National Park Service</u> offers a free Annual Pass to all military members and dependents.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Military Fee Waiver

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers accepts the National Park Annual Pass for U.S.

Military at the more than 2,500 USACE managed recreation areas, which include boat launches and swimming areas across the United States.

Diners, Drive-Ins, and Dives

Any fan of the Food Network will be familiar with Guy Fieri's show *Diners, Drive-Ins and Dives,* which showcases the hole-in-the-wall restaurants that only the locals would know and love. Destinations & Discounts



Military families have access to some of the most coveted vacation spots around the world.

Check out these destinations!

Florida: One of the most popular vacation spots for families. Walt Disney World is home to Shades of Green, an Armed Services Recreation Center.

Virginia: Home to Colonial Williamsburg, Busch Gardens and Water Country USA offer free passes through the Waves of Honor Program

California: <u>SeaWorld San Diego</u> offers free admission to military and dependents.

General Discounts

With airlines charging fees for checked baggage, check ahead of time to see if they waive the fees for active duty military and/or their dependents. These fees certainly can add to the bottom line of vacation expenses, so choosing an airline that doesn't charge extra fees can free up money for other items.

If your plans don't take you far from home, check with your local ITT/MWR office for discounted tickets to attractions in your area.

As a general rule of thumb, try presenting your military ID when checking out at stores and restaurants or just ask if various places offer military discounts. You might just be surprised how many places will give you 10% off your purchases.

Destinations Overseas

Germany

Bask in the beauty of the Bavarian Alps in Germany.

The <u>Edelweiss</u> resort offers high adventure in one of the premier sporting areas in Germany with spacious guest rooms and cozy log cabins with access to wellness clubs, pools, spas, dining, and guided tours.



South Korea

If you're stationed in Asia, then the <u>Dragon Hill Lodge</u> in Seoul, South Korea is the perfect destination.

Located in the heart of Seoul, explore the rich and diverse culture that is South Korea. Visit museums, art exhibits, teahouses, landmarks, and more. The resort offers beautiful rooms, access to health club, pool, dining, and lounge.

Hawaii

Ah yes, **Hawaii**! What a wonderful tropical destination, but also expensive. However, again there are some great facilities to take advantage of that can make even this resort destination affordable. Another facility that is a member of the Armed Forces Recreation Centers is the <u>Hale Koa Hotel</u>, located right on the beach at Waikiki, Oahu.

Another facility is the <u>Kilauea Military Camp Mountain Cottage Resor</u>ts on the Big Island of Hawaii. The KMC is located in Hawaii Volcanoes National Park and offers guest cottages as well as dormitories.

Military Lodging for Vacation Travel



Each branch handles their lodging polices differently, so it's important to be in direct contact with the facility to understand their rules regarding fees, reservation priorities, and cancellations.

Military lodging is typically available for:

- ☐ Military and civilian travelers on official orders
- Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, Navy, Federal Government, and DOD personnel on temporary duty
- Active duty military and families on Permanent Change of Station official orders
- Active duty and families on a space-available basis
- Military retirees and their families
- ☐ Widows/widowers/dependents of retired military personnel
- ☐ National Guard and Army Reserve Members and their families
- Other circumstances where guests may qualify for stays including medical patients or foreign military members.

Plan Ahead!

- Timing and preplanning are keys to making the best use of military lodging. During the summer PCS season, popular facilities are booked months in advance.
- Don't forget the
 opportunities available
 near military lodging.
 Exchanges and
 commissaries will save
 money, as will leisure
 ticket offices for
 excursions.
 Medical/dental care
 and pharmacies are
 available if the need
 arises.
- The worry of stored belongings in trailers or car storage units is also somewhat alleviated because of secure access to the base.



Flights are not guaranteed You could end up waiting and losing leave You could be on a comfy plane or in a cargo hold

Your terminal may not be near your destination



Seating may not be very comfortable Temperature may not be ideal There may be unscheduled changes There may be long delays



Have a light meal prior to flight Bring snacks and water Bring entertainment Bring ear plugs

Many factors come into play before actually boarding the plane, such as your priority level and acquiring the proper documentation.

Thinking of flying Space-A to save some money on travel? Space-A Travel ("Space-Available") on military aircraft involves planning well in advance and having time to spare.

Fly Space-A if:

- You have ample leave.
- You have time to scour Facebook and "like" terminal pages near your preferred departure and arrival destinations.
- An air tight back-up plan in place.
- Fear of the unknown isn't a stressor.

Don't Fly Space-A if:

- You need to attend an important occasion.
- It's the <u>holiday season</u>.
- The family will be disappointed spending part of your vacation waiting for open flights.
- Creature comforts are high priority.

Safe Travel Tips

Whether or not you're a seasoned traveler, being aware and prepared is important.

Don't get distracted. A common ploy of thieves (in other countries or here at home) is to distract you with several people begging, by holding a sign or flyer in your face, or other means. Be aware and take note of landmarks and surroundings.



Secure your cash and credit

cards. You may not love the "fashion statement" of travel wallets that strap to your body, but they're invaluable. Also, notify credit card companies and your bank if you'll be traveling overseas.

Keep electronics and valuables out of sight. When traveling by car, keep valuables under wrap, even for quick stops. Remove valuables and important documents from the car when you stop for the evening or even better, leave them at home.

Secure lodging in advance. Use <u>PCS Lodging to make reservations at military</u> temporary lodging facilities or hotels along your route to ensure that you always have a safe place to stop for the night. If you're traveling with pets, be sure to make reservations at pet-friendly establishments.

Blend in. While you may not look *exactly* like a local, try not to stand out. This means plainer clothes and no white socks with sandals! Also be careful of broadcasting the fact that you don't know where you are.

Large purchases such as airline tickets, hotels, car rentals, restaurants.



Debit and ATM Cards

Best for:


Getting cash in the local currency.

Best for:

The first 24 hours of your trip, until you can get to an ATM.



Prepaid Cards and Traveler's Checks

Best for:

Emergency backup if you can't find an ATM and/or you run out of cash.



Keep Your Home Safe While You Travel

You've probably seen the well-intended Facebook posts warning family and friends to avoid sharing information about their vacations and holiday travels.

For those with a public social media profile, sharing a picture of yourself in the Bahamas is akin to laying out a welcome mat for would-be burglars. It doesn't matter that your address isn't listed on your Facebook profile; you'd be surprised what someone with limited hacking skills can find.

Then again, beyond a few anecdotes, how many burglars truly stalk Facebook accounts to find out if a home is vacant? The real dangers for the safety of your home exist in and around it. To keep your home safe during holiday travel, you'll need to do more than avoid the temptation of the immediate gratification of

getting likes for your beach photos.

Don't let your mail pile up!

Either have a friend collect it or use USPS hold service.

Schedule yard maintenance.

Nothing says "we're gone" like piled up leaves or snow.

Automate lights and security systems.

Ask a neighbor to set out trash

cans and pick up packages and flyers, to help make the home appear occupied.

Protect your pipes. Outside intruders aren't the only danger to your home while you're away. During winter travel, freezing presents a real danger to your water system. To help prevent water damage, turn off the main water source to your house.

Protect your electronics. Unplug your electronics and small appliances, including the television, your computer, and small kitchen appliances.
