1910.147 Lockout/Tagout (LOTO)	-Covers the servicing and maintenance of machines and equipment in which the “unexpected” energization or start up of the Machines or equipment, or release of stored energy could cause injury to employees. -Required to remove or bypass a guard or other safety device or is required to place any part of their body into the point of operation of machines or equipment or a danger zone exists during a machine operating cycle. *See also 1910.332, 333, 334 and 335 – Electrical Safety Work Practice	●	● 1.
