

Grubs Begin to Make Their way to the Surface After Winter Slumber. Grub changes to Pupa, then Adult Japanese Beetle and Emerges from the Soil. Adult Japanese Beetle Activity on the Surface is Seen. Adults begin to mate in 2-3 days from Hatching. Adult Japanese Beetles Lay Eggs in Soil of Lawn. Eggs will Hatch soon and Young Larvae will Begin to Feed. Young Grub Larvae Continues to Feed, and Lawn Damage is Starting to Show. Larvae Feeds on Roots, Killing Grass in Patches.

Well Fed, Young Grubs Begin to Dig Down into Soil Preparing for Winter.

Protected from Cold Ohio Winters, Grubs Lay Dormant Preparing for Spring Push.
