CHAIRMAN

OF THE BOARD



This past year has set MAP apart in the area of humanitarian relief. Let me highlight a couple of outstanding ventures in 2014:

In the Philippines, Typhoon Haiyan hit at a force of a Category 5 Super Typhoon. With over 6,000 dead, MAP rushed to the scene within days to provide medical aid in the most critically hit areas. Today the communities are rebuilding and MAP is still there helping to restock clinics that were destroyed.

Within weeks of the first Ebola case reported in Liberia, MAP's teams were prepared for the response. This unexpected outbreak has continued for nearly a year now without an end in sight, but our team has held strong and is utilizing our partners to provide Personal Protective Gear to health care workers on the front lines in three countries.

Nearly a year has passed since God called my wife, Sook Hee, and me to MAP International to serve people in need around the world who do not have access to lifesaving medicines. Previously, I had not known about MAP; but when I learned the impact the organization and its partners are having around the world, I was compelled to join the team.

In Matthew 25:35 Jesus tells us, "when I was sick and you looked after me." This is why MAP was founded 60 years ago. MAP is a Christian non-governmental organization that serves all people in need in more than 100 countries around the world -- regardless of race, gender or religion.

Working collaboratively with donors, implementing partners, and corporations, MAP provides over 25 million treatments (medicines and supplies) each year around the world. Most of us cannot imagine not being able to go to the local pharmacy to obtain antibiotics when our children get sick; but this is the reality for the 1.4 billion people around the world who live on less than \$2.00 a day. We take for granted immunizations that protect our loved ones against measles, small-pox, polio, and other diseases. But what we take for granted is simply unavailable to much of the world.

Each morning I put on two full length leg braces (my shoes are attached to the braces so I never have to look for my shoes) and I use crutches to walk. I'm reminded every day that I wasn't fortunate enough to get the polio vaccine when I was one year old living in South Korea. I've visited many children and families in developing countries who are just waiting for someone to give them a hand up and not a handout. I've looked into their eyes and they are full of promise and hope but they need our help to realize their God-given potential. This is what gets me excited about serving at MAP with other like-minded Board Members, staff, partners, and, most importantly depore like you who make our work possible. importantly, donors like you who make our work possible.

I want to personally thank you for your support as we work together to help even more people around the world to have access to lifesaving medicines. Are you ready to pour yourself out as an offering for those in need? If you are, come join us in our work and get ready for your cup to overflow.





MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

OF GLOBAL ESSENTIAL MEDICINES SUPPLIES & SERVICES (GEMS)

2014 has been a very busy year for our GEMS Team. Thanks to the GIK donations from our pharmaceutical partners and our partners in the field using our medicines and supplies, we have over achieved our goal projections. We gained several new partners in 2014 that we look forward to working with for many years to come.

In November 2013, Typhoon Haiyan took the lives of over 6,000 people, leaving the Philippines in desperate need of aid. MAP was on the ground within days and provided critical medicines and supplies totaling over \$14 million. Women and children were spared from disease because of the items we were able to provide, people were treated for wounds and pneumonia while clinics were restocked after they were rebuilt following the storm.

MAP's GEMS Program had one of our highest years in history, ensuring that we provide medical aid to those suffering.

MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT

OF GLOBAL PROGRAMS



The MAP Global Programs Team had a very productive year in our eight global offices. Here are just a few things that were accomplished with the support of our donors, partners and our talented staff on the ground.

In Ghana nearly 300 health care workers were trained by MAP on how to detect and manage Buruli ulcer and Leprosy cases, while an additional 562 volunteers were trained on how to stop Buruli and Leprosy early. In 2013 our team in Ghana started a school at our Tumiamayenko Total Health Village with 13 students. We now have over 100 students with two trained teachers. A wound dressing room has been rehabilitated in the Asunafo South District to better treat those in need.

Uganda had an impressive year, selecting 7 new villages for hygiene and sanitation programs and triggering Community Led Total Sanitation projects in 2 villages. Our team distributed water filters to 50 families, repaired 3 boreholes, constructed 2 rock water harvesting systems and 1 sand dam to improve access to safe water. 15 community vaccinators were trained in proper vaccination to increase our immunization coverage to 80%! Thankfully only one case of measles was reported this year, it is the eighth highest killer of children in Uganda. We also had the privilege to provide 120 new desks to the local schools.

People experience health and empowerment in Indonesia in 2014. Over 1,000 people in the TMICHE project were educated on public health and nutritional milk was distributed to the school. The Tello Island project treated Tuberculosis patients and provided them with nutritional aids to help in their recovery and hundreds of children were taught English.



MAP Tello distributed water filters to hundreds of households, providing safe drinking water. The Tello Mobile Clinic treated nearly 3,000 people on remote islands only accessible by boat.

MAP Bolivia trained the Chilimarca community on child health and carried out a nutritional program to teach healthy eating habits. The MAP Community Pharmacy now operates 24/7, 365 days a year – giving access to medical care to the Chilimarca community. They treated over 1,300 children this year and over 1,700 people for wound care. Nearly 3,000 dogs and cats were also vaccinated to prevent the spread of Rabies. MAP Bolivia program in Child Abuse Management and Prevention program provided support to nearly 200 victims of sexual violence in 2014. The Morochata Total Health Villages worked very hard this year to stop the transmission of Chagas, a Neglected Tropical Disease in Bolivia. Nearly 4,000 people were taught about Chagas prevention.

MAP Kenya set up a water system having a capacity to store over 30,000 liters of water for the Burangi community that serves nearly 600 people. The phase 2 in construction of the clinic that will benefit the Burangi community is completed. That will help address the need for access to medical care. In partnership with Waterfall and Poweron S.A.,

MAP Ecuador began a First Infancy Health Program in 2014, this project focused on children from birth through three in 11 communities. Families have learned to better care for their children during the most crucial time of development, there are nearly 300 children in this project. Our other West Africa offices, Cote d'Ivoire and Liberia have shared incredible stories of hope from Leprosy and Ebola projects that I would like you to read more in depth on the following pages. In 2014, you've given us the opportunity to do our work around the world and impact so many lives that were in desperate need of health and hope.

Giving Hope

Fredrick is 26 years old and was raised by a single father in rural Kenya. He had to drop out of primary school due to financial issues and began farming with his father from a very young age. "We struggled because of lack of resources and little knowledge of farming," said Fredrick. "I joined the Giving Hope Project through MAP International in 2008 and everything changed. We went through dream and empowerment training where we were provided with water pipes and a sprayer. After additional agriculture and irrigation training we were shown the right crops that could elevate our economic status and I discovered that tomatoes and kale could best help me and my family."

"Today I have a good network with other farmers, produce buyers and seed companies as a result of referrals from MAP. I was even able to buy my wife a dairy cow, I thought that was beyond my ability. I am happy to share my story with others, may God bless MAP and Church World Service for this project.

Kameyor was just six years old when he dropped out of school. He was the youngest child, his family's sweet little boy – and they didn't know what to do when a nodule appeared on him. It quickly grew and became an ulcer and began eating away at his skin.

Kameyor was teased at school and bullied because of the ulcer. His family took him to a clinic sponsored by MAP and American Leprosy Missions and they found help. The health care worker identified Kameyor's ulcer as Buruli ulcer, a Neglected Tropical Disease often found in Ghana.

He completed his treatment with amazing results and is now completely healed. Catching this early prevented Kameyor from disfigurement.

"There was no hope for my son," said Kameyor's father with tears in his eyes. "Thank God that my son is now getting better and can continue the education that I desire for him. He will have a better future so our livelihood can change."

Now he can be seen for the adorable child that he is.

Hope For Tomorrow

This is Ezekiel, he lives in Cote d'Ivoire and just turned eleven. For years Ezekiel has had regular stomach pain, bloating, nausea and itching and it has caused him to have trouble focusing in primary school.

"I felt tired all the time," says Ezekiel.
"All these troubles impeded me to
follow carefully in classes. Today I
feel better." This year, Ezekiel was
given deworming medication from
MAP International. "Since then,
these troubles have totally
disappeared." Ezekiel says, "today,
thanks to this deworming I feel
better."

Ezekiel is now attentive in class and his marks have greatly improved in school. Now he can enjoy school and playing with his friends and lead a happy healthy life.

"I take this opportunity to thank MAP International as well as all its donors that provided deworming medicines to me. This action relieved me too much. I encourage all the supporters to MAP International to renew their charity actions toward us children because they contribute to our success at school. May God bless the donors and give them hundredfold their donations." said Ezekiel.



SAVING GRACE

Grace is tough. She's been suffering with Leprosy since she was only three years old. She is the only daughter with six brothers living in a rural village in Cote d'Ivoire. Suffering from Leprosy hasn't been easy.

Early on, no one knew why this young child had patches on her hands. Leprosy, even though curable has a stigma that causes people, even children to be alienated from the community. Seeking a normal life for her daughter, Grace's mother sent her to Chinese healers in the community and for a short time - it worked.

When the same patches reappeared on her hands, her mother took her to a rural clinic where MAP International and American Leprosy Misisons work together to stop the spread of Leprosy.

"The nurse gave me some injections and a few days later my hands were back to normal." - Grace

The Leprosy came back this year and Grace knew just where to go - the clinic. She received a full course of treatment for Leprosy and her patches have now cleared up.



DISASTER RELIEF













Thanks to the support of our donors and partners, Weedor Zum survived the Ebola virus this year. She had a long journey and lost many family members, including her mother - but thanks to the support from the ELWA Ebola Treatment Facility where MAP provides Personal Protective Suits, gloves and N-95 facemasks to protect the healthcare workers, Weedor's life was saved.





2014 was a difficult year in Liberia. The Ebola virus took the lives of over 3,000 people in the span of 7 months. Thanks to the support of the MAP team and all of our invaluable partners, we have played an integral part in the reduction of cases – especially in healthcare workers.

We are now down to an average of 1 case per day, but Personal Protective Suits (PPEs) still remain critical in containing the virus. Students have been unable to attend school for months due to the disease and there are hopes of finally reopening schools in February. Working with our amazing partners, Water Missions International, American Leprosy Missions, Effect:Hope, Leprosy Ireland and many others we have been able to provide hygiene and sanitation kits to 1,600 households. Over 3,000 volunteers in 9 counties have been trained in Ebola prevention and over 22,500 people have been educated on Ebola prevention and control. We have been broadcasting Ebola messaging to the entire geography of Liberia, ensuring that we can contain this deadly virus.

We worked to renovate the water hand pumps at The Office of the United Blind Association, which serves 120 blind and physically challenged individuals and to provide them with a soap production business to improve economic capacity. 18 communities, including 2 Ebola treatment facilities have been equipped with infrared thermometers to prevent the spread of infection. Further, 10,000 people in Dolo Town have been given access to safe drinking water that will provide 40,000 liters of water per day and we see a hope for a brighter future.


