Portia Mount's recently released book "Kick Some Glass: Ten Ways Women Succeed at Work on Their Own Terms" examines themes for women in leadership roles across sectors, at its heart recognizing the critical importance of resilience and self-care. Within the context of the leadership landscape for women and individual stories of challenge and success, her keynote will explore the themes most connected to our purpose here together. Portia will focus her time on three of the common themes she and her co-author discovered in their research:

- Intention + Values = Purpose Pairing one's desires and goals with one's core values creates a sense of purpose. Are you still fulfilling the purpose you established for yourself? Is the work you are doing a reflection of your values? Portia will explore examples of how women have created or rediscovered this alignment.
- Resilience: Get Fit to Lead A crucial issue for senior women leaders, Portia will focus on energy management and what she and her co-author learned about optimizing performance.
- Pay It Forward We need more women leaders in all areas of public and private life so more young girls can see themselves as leaders, yet research shows that young girls are opting out of leadership roles as early as elementary school. The role this group of women can play in both modeling and promoting women in leadership is vital.

This exploration is meant to energize, spur reflection, and encourage consideration of your legacy and impact. All participants will receive a copy of "Kick Some Glass."

In a grounded research study of 15 small college university presidents, linkages existed between wellbeing and leadership longevity. This presentation examines the various definitions of wellbeing and the factors that contributed to this wellbeing and leadership longevity among female university presidents. From spiritual practices, to disciplined exercise routines, to a network of female mentors, women thrive under different conditions than some of our male colleagues. Using humor, personal stories, and shared stories from other college presidents, this session will explore strategies that enable us to strengthen our wellbeing and resiliency and thereby ensure our longevity.

Fostering a culture of innovation in a university environment presents a unique set of challenges for presidents. This session introduces presidents to the innovation continuum – ideation, intelligence, integration, and implementation as phases in creating an innovative culture that encourages change. An initial assessment of where an institution is at on this continuum assists presidents and boards in developing coherent processes and realistic timelines for adoption of new initiatives.
