My family sustained damage during Hurricane Betsy (1965) and lost everything during Camille (1969). We moved back to Buras, La., and always knew the possibility of another hurricane wiping out our hometown, but I could never have been prepared for what happened during and

The night before the hurricane, I thought, what would I

need to do to prepare various aspects of my life should something happen to my home, or me, or if we would be without power for an extended period of time? As $\Theta \Phi A$ National President, certain responsibilities are placed upon me not aly by job description, but constitutionally. The night fore Katrina hit, I sent an e-mail to The Grand Council ΘΦA National Office transferring all duties to Karen ican, AΣ, National First Vice President. Hammond, La., where I live, about 50 miles north of Orleans, we received winds of 120-130 miles per hour.

As the morning of August 29 progressed, I wondered if I should have evacuated as well. That day was the most uncertain one of my life. I didn't know if my family or friends in

the area were okay. All we had was a battery operated radio. The nights were dark. We had no power, telephone, cell phone, or e-mail. Finally, after three days in Hammond, I traveled 40 miles to Baton Rouge to get supplies such as ice, gas and batteries. When I finally got in range to where my cell phone would connect, I had 164 emails on my

Blackberry and all of the subject lines read, "Are you okay?" As I began to read the e-mails, all I could do was weep and remember how fortunate I am to have so many people who really care about me. The e-mails were from Theta Phis-both collegians and alumnae, other National Panhellenic Conference Presidents, CAMPUSPEAK and Capstone colleagues, Greek advisors, students from campuses or conventions I had visited, and the list goes on. Text messages also started coming in and voice messages started registering, and I could hear the fear in each voice, not knowing if I was okay.

The days seem cloudy now, but those messages will always be etched in my heart and memory. The outpouring
