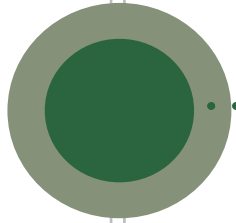
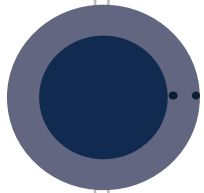


# OPINION: SECURITY LEADERS SHARE 2016 TRENDS



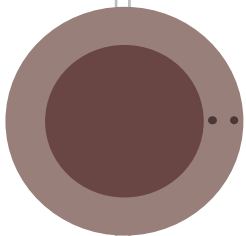

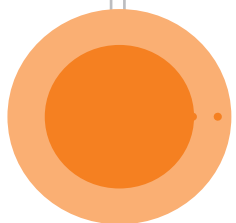
