





Q: What type of workout do you like to focus on most?

A: Every day for me it's a combination of weightlifting and cardio. It elevates the heart rate a lot faster if you do them together, and it'll also burn fat longer. The calories you burn should increase if you combine weightlifting and cardio.

Q: Do you listen to music while you exercise, and if so, what's your preferred genre?

A: I'm old school, so my playlist is a lot of that 70's music. It's that disco scene, you know; "The Hustle" and all that. But that was my era.

Q: Which celebrity would you want to work out with and why?

A: Hulk Hogan would be a great workout [partner]. In fact, when I lived in LA, I worked out at the same gym. So I actually saw his workout routines, and they are intense. I'd love to learn from somebody like that.

Creativity is a very formable concept: it is merely the expression of ingenuity and imagination combined. Regina Rohm, a ceramic artist whose passion for pottery and love of the Lord is impacting others for the better, is a wonderful personification of creativity.

From an early age, Rohm displayed a love and talent for art. "I spent hours on end as a young child painting or drawing. From the age of seven my parents told me that I could be an artist. I would look at them and giggle 'you just say that because you're my parents,'" says Rohm.

Rohm's skills and passion for art flourished throughout middle and high school with her parents' continuous encouragement. Yet, as she approached college, she became frustrated with her studies, until she followed her passion. After a few art classes here at Southeastern, Rohm quickly realized that becoming an artist was not just a dream, but something she could accomplish. "Up until college, I had never truly taken pride in my work," says Rohm. "I realized quickly once I took art classes here that I am a good artist and that it wasn't just something my parents said as a kid — they had meant it every time. I realized art was something I loved and wanted to continue to pursue." It was not long, however, before the next fear from life started to burn in Rohm's mind: "How on earth was I going to create a career out of art?"





Very quickly, the moment of worry became one of surrender. "Not once had I put my plans down and accepted God's plans for my life," says Rohm. "I realized God was standing right next to me, holding the blueprints He had made for my life, waiting patiently for me to put my plans down and take a hold of His. God said to me 'if only you knew the plans I have for you. How fulfilling they would be to your life.' I responded 'God, I believe I'm supposed to be an artist — I'm done running, I'm done denying. Art is an ability you have given me; how can I use this ability for You?'"

God answered her prayer through the divine intervention of a local potter in December of 2020, who happened to be praying for someone to assist with his company. Rohm began working there in January of 2021, and has grown tremendously in the past year, not only as an artist, but also as a servant of the Lord. Through the proceeds received from her artwork, Rohm has been able to donate to organizations such as Hospitality for the Homeless, a club on campus.

When asked about her favorite piece, Rohm's answer beautifully illustrates the workmanship of God's love. "My favorite piece is a curvy, decorative bowl with texture carved into it. Originally the bowl was perfect and round until I knocked it off the potter's wheel and it fell on the floor. One of the walls was cracked and the rest of the bowl was misshapen. I took the bowl, patched up the break, and proceeded to curve the walls of the bowl to hide the fact that it had fallen to the floor. It ended up being a lovely piece that goes to show that perfect isn't always beautiful. Just like the cracked and misshapen bowl, God takes us and restores us, making us more beautiful than we could have ever imagined."

From interviews with designers over why they choose a certain stitch or graphic to the simple fact that everyone gets dressed, fashion is a creative well that is so much deeper than first perceived.





'It's so important to know the sociology of fashion because everyone has a specific style to themselves whether they know it or not, and I think that's [fascinating]. Fashion is a reflection of life, as art reflect life and life reflects art."

In an exciting flash of events, Marcellus recently had the opportunity to attend New York Fashion Week on behalf of the magazine she works for as a contributing intern. While she's decided to postpone her trip until next February, it's a step in the right direction towards her ideal career.

"Editor-in-Chief of Teen Vogue has always been my goal... I can feel it in my bones that I can do it." Marcellus cites Lindsay Peoples Wagner, the former editor-in-chief of Teen Vogue, as her guiding inspiration

'We're both first-generation Haitian Americans, so her view is very similar to mine... like my parents wanted me to become a doctor or lawyer.... but [Lindsay and I] want to experience the American dream for ourselve I always want my parents to be proud of me, but I wan to be proud of myself first and foremost... s fellow creatives, we can all learn from Marcellus's experience and observations.








