- Connecting to case managers serving older adults: It was a pleasure to present on Building a
 Toolkit to Prevent Homelessness for Older Adults at the <u>Case Management Society of New England</u>'s
 26th Annual Conference on October 2, in Boxborough, MA. What a great group of participants! We had
 a lot to talk about, including how a high dose of case manager + a low dose of lawyer = elder
 homelessness prevention rates > 90% for 2 years running in the context of our Aging Right in the
 Community pilot with Boston Medical Center's Elders Living at Home Program.
- What do Massachusetts, Vermont, Florida and California have in common? A commitment to
 innovating pediatric primary care in ways that measurably enhance protective factors for families.
 Building on the promising findings from the DULCE study conducted at Boston Medical Center,
 theCenter for the Study of Social Policy is leading a replication effort in five communities in CA, FL, and
 VT that involve a range of closely coordinated interdisciplinary service providers. We are delighted to be
 providing technical assistance to the legal teams participating in this initiative.
- Downloading how legal advocates can engage in academic medical research successfully and live to tell the tale: Thank you very much to the <u>National Center for Medical-Legal Partnership</u> for hosting us and Dr. Naomi Ko (Assistant Professor of Medicine, Section of <u>Hematology</u> <u>Oncology & Women's Health Unit</u>, <u>Boston University School of Medicine</u>) on a Research Brief webinar on September 22. It was terrific to get questions from national peers on how we're evaluating our <u>P-CORI</u> and <u>American Cancer Society</u>-funded *Innovation in Cancer Care Delivery Using a Patient-Centered and Community Research Approach*. The intervention we're testing leverages a high dose of patient navigator + a low dose of lawyer!

TIMELY TIP

It Takes Two! Many healthcare staff don't realize that people often can't access health-promoting benefits and services without medical certifications or "doctor's letters." For example, an adult's application for disability benefits and FMLA (Family and Medical Leave Act) protections requires a medical certification. And a child's application for disability benefits or special education services from the school system also requires medical evidence and opinions. The healthcare workforce actually functions as a powerful gatekeeper to many critical resources like those. For the most part, providers who work with individuals and their families across the age and health continuum must navigate this gatekeeper role day-to-day without much training or back-up. Simultaneously, individuals and families have little support in how to approach a provider about these documents, and they can be difficult conversations. In a patient-centered environment that meaningfully accounts for social and environmental drivers of health, we have to better support these high-impact interactions. That's why our 11/3 annual conference is focused on this topic, and why we partnered with the J.E. and Z.B. Butler Foundation to build a pilot portfolio of tools that can support better communication between patients and providers around these high-stakes paperwork requests.
