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#### **Letter from the President & CEO**

As we reflect on 2016, it's incredible to see what our community's support has accomplished for families in Southern Alberta with Habitat for Humanity. Last year was a record-setting year for us – 23 families became Habitat homeowners, giving 63 children a firm foundation.

Beyond the numbers, we're especially focused on the long-term impact of affordable home ownership and what it really means for families: the chance to build strength, stability and independence. We see families move from a state of holding on or just getting by, to a position of confidence, with the ability to thrive and succeed in every area of their lives.

We have much to celebrate from the past year, and in this report, you will find numbers and facts that we're proud to present. However, we're most excited about the stories behind those numbers – the changed lives of families and the transformed communities.



And while we are proud of these families and these accomplishments, we also know that there are so many more families just waiting for this same opportunity to build better futures.

One in five of us don't have a safe, affordable place to live, and are living in core housing need, in and out of short-term fixes like run-down rentals or subsidized housing. We're facing an escalating affordable housing crisis across Canada and right here in Southern Alberta, and it's becoming increasingly more difficult for families to break into the housing market.

We know first-hand that families are paying too much rent and are often forced to move from place to place to find suitable living arrangements for their kids. This has a devastating impact on children. Kids are forced to uproot their lives – attending different schools, finding new friends – in the middle of important, formative years.

When families feel safe and secure in their own homes, when they have pride and ownership over their future, everyone benefits. When parents can provide much-needed stability for their kids, they can confidently plan for their children's futures.

We know that it's only through our community's support that we can continue to create a sustainable housing solution for families. This year's successes would not have been possible without *every volunteer*, *every donor* and *every community partner* who made a commitment to building better futures.

In 2016, nearly 3,000 volunteers gave more than 66,000 hours of their time to our construction sites, ReStores, events, office and committees. And we were fortunate to have the continued financial contributions of countless corporate sponsors, individuals, suppliers, trades, foundations and service clubs. Every one of you has made a difference that will truly last a lifetime.

Together, we can ensure that *every child* has the chance to grow in a safe environment, *every parent* has the dignity of providing their kids with a stable home, and *every family* has the chance to write their own story. So with every wall, every deck, and every doorway, this is what we're building.

HABITAT DONORS HELP FAMILIES BUILD A FIRM FOUNDATION FOR THEIR CHILDREN

Habitat homes are a safe haven. Prior to becoming Habitat homeowners, our families often describe living in hazardous housing conditions. Kids are at risk of injury from poor construction or environmental toxins. Long-term exposure to mold can lead to chronic illnesses such as asthma. Overcrowding is also a concern as it often causes stomach ailments and can lead to mental health issues.

Parents of children with disabilities face unique challenges trying to find accessible housing that they can afford. Habitat is proud to have constructed accessible and affordable homes for families with children with special needs.

Habitat builds homes above code with adequate space for all family members. We carefully select family-friendly communities with suitable amenities. Your generosity means we can engage professional trades and architects, ensuring that our homes are safe and built to last. Partner families participate in home maintenance classes to enable them to keep their home in good condition.

#### **REDSTONE | CALGARY, AB**

In April 2016, we broke ground on an accessible duplex in the northeast community of Redstone that was designed to meet the needs of children in each family.

Features include a barrier-free main floor, an accessible washroom and wheelchair ramps. These homes were complete in November 2016.

#### PINERIDGE PLACE | CALGARY, AB

We broke ground on the first phase of this development in 2015, and in June of 2016, eight families purchased their homes to become Habitat homeowners.

The entire development of 24 homes is slated for completion in late 2017.

#### RAVENSWOOD | AIRDRIE, AB

In January 2016, we broke ground on six homes in the community of Rayenswood in Airdrie.

These homes were complete and purchased by families in November 2016.

#### **BOWNESS | CALGARY, AB**

In late 2016, we broke ground on a sixplex in the northwest community of Bowness in Calgary.

This is the first of several Habitat projects that will be taking place in Bowness, and we are grateful for the community's support.

#### **5TH AVE | HIGH RIVER, AB**

In 2015, we broke ground on the first Foothills Chapter build project in High River.

In January 2016, we welcomed two High River families into their new homes.

#### **RENOVATIONS**

Along with building new homes, we renovate and refurbish homes that are sold back to us by partner families.

This gives another family the chance to partner with Habitat to have the same opportunity to create a home in a safe and stable environment.

In 2016, we completed five renovations in Calgary, Cochrane and Brooks.

YOUR GIFT TO HABITAT FOR HUMANITY HELPS PARENTS THRIVE

Parents want what is best for their kids. Research shows that parents living with housing instability face significant challenges when it comes to providing for their children.


These circumstances may cause parents to have chronic anxiety while worrying about the safety of their home and meeting their family's basic needs. Working multiple jobs means parents do not get to spend much quality time with their kids.

Everyone needs to feel connected and have friends they can rely on. When families move frequently they may feel like they lack support and a sense of community; something many people take for granted.

As Habitat homeowners, parents can build financial capacity to care for their children. Healthy meals, extracurricular activities, family outings, and college savings all become possibilities.

With reasonable mortgage payments, families who partner with Habitat can work fewer jobs, allowing for more quality and stress-free time with their kids. Research concludes that homeownership is a reflection of the priorities that parents have set for their kids. Simply put, homeownership sets parents up for success!

### Children's participation in extracurricular activities increased after their parents became Habitat homeowners.



#### Nichole's Story

#### LIFE BEFORE HABITAT

"Life before Habitat was hard," Nichole says, somewhat apologetically. Nichole has raised her children on her own since fleeing domestic violence in 2005.

Her eldest Robert and Mykalya were born 11 months apart and Michael, three years later. Despite the hardships endured, this spiritual woman with sparkling eyes is no victim. She is resilience personified.

"As a single mother, you constantly face judgement; people make assumptions about the support you receive," Nichole explains. A certified life coach, eventually Nichole trained as a junior estimator for an industrial insulation company – a job she has held for the past eight years.

Before her current employment, Nichole juggled the demands of motherhood while working nine days in the field with four days off. Managing childcare was taxing and Nichole hated being away from her kids.

Thankfully, a position opened in Airdrie. While she is proud of her career, she was always on the cusp of being eligible for any financial assistance. "I didn't even qualify for a discount at the pool," she explains.

On paper, this means that before Habitat, Nichole's rent devoured one entire paycheque. She became adept at negotiating payments for utilities and the family survived on pasta. During this trying time, Nichole had to cope with huge unpredictable rent increases. A moldy basement made her son ill.



Her family even lived in a house eventually condemned by the city. All told, she moved nine times in 10 years. Then, her son Robert received a type 1 diabetes diagnosis. On top of all this, she was owed \$70,000 in child support – the debt is still outstanding today.

The challenges piled on and eventually the chronic stress took its toll. Nichole describes living in a constant state of fear, feeling isolated in every aspect of her life.

There were moments of kindness along her journey – like the property management company who waived the required credit report needed to secure an apartment. The landlord who let her pay the rent over two paycheques was a blessing. "That stuff was magic," she says, smiling.

Throughout all of the turbulence, this dedicated mom tried to create a sense of normalcy for her children, encouraging them to pursue their dreams.

#### THIS ONE THING

"My kids drive me. I want them to have a stable and secure life." That motivation inspired Nichole to apply for a Habitat home after her sister spotted an ad in a local paper. After completing her home ownership classes and 500 required volunteer hours, Nichole and her brood moved in to their new home in the fall of 2016.

Nichole describes the process of seeing her house being constructed as extraordinary. Being part of this unique and personal experience was empowering – especially having her son Robert building alongside her.

The kids have settled in nicely and have really planted their feet. The craziness has dissipated and the family feels grounded. "We are evolving," she says.

Now her problems pale in comparison to the past. How to accommodate the 10 friends her older kids wanted to have over the same night? After her initial hesitation, Nichole realized this was a very good sign.

Their enormous family dog Maverick – a welcome addition – dug a tunnel under the fence to the neighbour's house. A sense of panic ensued until the neighbour deduced that Bongo and Maverick were meant to have playdates together. How to decorate the rooms? What to plant in the garden? Fun decisions to make! Michael refusing to eat pasta for the time being. Understandable.

Even though an unstable economy and some health issues linger, Nichole now has reserves. She continues to draw on her life coaching tools to cope.

The little community that Habitat built is thriving. Neighbours watch out for each other's kids. "I have a safety net. I can knock on my neighbours' doors! That's a first. I feel like I belong in the community!" This transformational change is possible thanks to Habitat donors and volunteers.

#### THE FUTURE - OUR FATE IN OUR HANDS

Every morning when Nichole walks down the stairs to the kitchen, she pauses on the last step. It feels surreal to her. Her mind flashes back to the volunteers building her house. There is no more stigma or isolation. "To see strangers coming together to help me; that was an incredible act of love."

Robert is managing his diabetes, working when he is not in school. He is off to MRU to study business and marketing next year. Mykayla is a passionate humanitarian with a love for volleyball. She attended an international Lions Youth Camp in Waterton last July, making life-long friends with kids from all over the world.

Michael has transformed his (first ever) closet into a gaming centre. His mother describes him as, "one of the most thoughtful young men you'll ever meet. He has an uncanny ability to be empathetic!"

Who knows what else the future has in store? "We're accountable, we decide our fate. We've earned this!" she says beaming with pride. Yes, Nichole, you most certainly have.

All funds raised through the tournament were donated to four local agencies, including Habitat for Humanity Southern Alberta.





#### **INTERFAITH BUILD PROJECT**

Members of Calgary's faith communities have come together to put their faith into action.

The goal of the Interfaith Build Project, co-chaired by Rabbi Shaul Osadchey and Archbishop Greg Kerr-Wilson, is to raise \$1M to build 10 units of affordable housing in Calgary and Southern Alberta.







#### **Crew Leaders**


Crew Leaders are regular construction volunteers with Habitat for Humanity, and they are a vital part of our organization.


Some of my favourite moments are watching families get their housewarming cookie jar and the keys to their new place. Those are the moments when I just want to cheer because I see that life turns around for them.
