

Radiography Requirements

To legally operate dental x-ray equipment and perform dental radiographic procedures in South Dakota, an individual must be registered as a Dental Radiographer. To qualify, one must:

Be at least 18 years of age

South Dakota

AND Hold a high school diploma or its equivalent

AND Complete a 16-hour program or course of study in dental radiography approved by the South Dakota State Board of Dentistry (SDSBD) within six months of application

OR
Hold a current national DANB Certified Dental Assistant (CDA) certification

Complete a 16-hour SDSBDapproved program or course of study in dental radiography and hold current registration as a dental radiographer from a dental licensing board in a different state

AND

Apply to the SDSBD for Dental Radiography Licensure

To qualify, one must:

Hold a current American Heart Association Healthcare Provider or American Red Cross Professional Rescuer CPR certification

<u>AND</u>

Graduate from a CODA-accredited dental assisting program or another dental assisting program or expanded functions course approved by the South Dakota State Board of Dentistry (SDSBD) OR

Hold current national DANB Certified Dental Assistant (CDA) certification ÒR

Hold a certificate of competency from the SDSBD*

Apply to the SDSBD for licensure as a Registered Dental Assistant

*Note: To earn a certificate of competency from the SDSBD, a candidate must pass a written exam on expanded functions administered by the SDSBD or DANB and present written documentation from a South Dakota dentist attesting to clinical proficiency after performing expanded functions under the dentist's personal supervision for at least 180 days.

A dental assistant in South Dakota must hold a high school diploma or its equivalent and must be at least 18 years of age. An assistant who meets these requirements may perform basic supportive dental procedures under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist.

There are no training requirements for this level of dental assisting.

The ADAA/DANB Alliance developed a listing of standardized job titles (left) based on its national Core Competencies Study conducted from 2002-2005.

The same study utilized a list of 70 job functions which were determined to be representative of a broad range of dental assisting core competencies.

Functions in this state that relate to the national DANB/ADAA Core Competencies Study are numbered to the right, using language directly from this state's dental practice act. (The numbers correspond to the study's task numbering system.)

Functions listed with bullets are part of this state's practice act but are not specific matches to DANB/ADAA research.

These state templates reflect the work done by the ADAA/ DANB Alliance to support a uniform national model for one set of dental assisting tasks, levels and requirements, which will serve as a viable career ladder for dental assistants.

Functions <u>NOT</u> Permitted by Dental Assistants in SD

The following functions are not permitted by any level of dental assistant:

- 12, 33. Placing, finishing and adjusting of final restorations
- Cutting of hard or soft tissue
- Intraoral procedures that will be used directly in the fabrication of a dental prosthesis
- Irreversible procedures Injection of medication, other than as permitted for dental assistants qualified in injection of medications (see p. 128 for requirements)
- Administration of nitrous oxide analgesia, other than as permitted for Registered Dental Assistants holding a permit to perform this function (see p. 128 for requirements)
- Preliminary examination of the oral cavity and surrounding strúctures, including periodontal
- screening Complete prophylaxis Those procedures allocated to dental hygienists, with the exception of placement of sealants and coronal polishing following a prophylaxis by a dentist or dental hygienist

DANB's Note on Allowable Dental Assisting Functions

In the state of South Dakota, all dental assistants may:

- Perform infection control and occupational safety procedures
- Perform other duties not specified by this state's dental practice act

At this time, DANB cannot list all allowable dental assisting functions for each state because some states' dental practice acts outline very specific allowable functions while others outline only prohibited functions and some contain minimal or no regulation of dental assisting duties.

Education/Training/ Credential Required

Job Title According to State of SD Allowable Functions

(Functions with numbers relate specifically to Core Competency designations; functions with bullets are in this state's practice act but are not specific matches to DANB research)

A Registered Dental Assistant may apply for a permit to administer nitrous oxide inhalation analgesia under the direct supervision of a dentist. To qualify, a Registered Dental Assistant must:

Be certified in administering basic life support by the American Heart Association for the Healthcare Provider or the American Red Cross for the Professional Rescuer program

AND

Have completed a SDSBD-approved educational course meeting specified requirements within 13 months of application

OR Have completed a SDSBD-approved educational course more than 13 months prior to application <u>and</u> have legally administered nitrous oxide inhalation analgesia for a period of time during the 3 years preceding application <u>and</u> provide written documentation from an employing/supervising dentist attesting to clinical proficiency

Registered Dental Assistant with a permit to administer nitrous oxide inhalation analgesia

<u>Injection of Medication:</u> A dentist holding a permit to administer general anesthesia/deep sedation or moderate sedation may authorize a Registered Dental Assistant or dental assistant, under the personal and direct visual supervision of the dentist and upon the dentist's verbal command, to inject medication that the supervising dentist has drawn up through an intravenous (IV) site if the following requirements have been met:

The assistant holds a permit to monitor patients under general anesthesia, deep sedation or moderate sedation

<u>AND</u> The assistant has passed the Dental Anesthesia Assistant National Certification Examination (DAANCE) administered by the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (AAOMS) and is currently DAANCE-certified

AND
The supervising dentist holds a permit to administer general anesthesia and deep sedation or moderate sedation

Registered Dental Assistants and dental assistants may apply for a permit to monitor patients under general anesthesia, deep sedation or moderate sedation. To qualify, an assistant must:

Be certified in administering basic life support by the American Heart Association for the Healthcare Provider or the American Red Cross for the Professional Rescuer program

Have completed a SDSBD-approved educational course in anesthetic assisting of at least eight hours within 13 months of application

OR Have complete a SDSBD-approved educational course in anesthetic assisting (min. 8 hours) more than 13 months prior to application and have legally monitored patients receiving analgesic or anesthetic agents for a period of time during the 2 years preceding application and provide written documentation from an employing/supervising dentist attesting to clinical proficiency

Registered Dental Assistants and dental assistants may start an intravenous line if they have taken a board-approved anesthesia assisting course and received intravenous line training.

**Note: In addition to the training and credentialing requirements in the left column, the following requirements must be met:

The supervising dentist draws up the medications that will be utilized during

The Registered Dental Assistant or dental assistant is operating under the personal supervision of the supervising dentist and the supervising dentist maintains direct visual supervision during the injection of the medication through an intravenous site

The supervising dentist authorizes the procedure by verbal command, clearly articulating the specific medication and the amount of the medication to be administered and the dental hygienist, registered dental assistant, or dental assistant repeats the verbal command back to the supervising dentist before injecting medication through an intravenous site.
