### WORDS OF WISDOM FROM ONE DAD TO ANOTHER

What does it truly mean to be merciful? There is a popular perception that being merciful means letting someone off the hook, but while there is a sense in which this is true, mercy means so much more.

Consider, for example, the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy.

The Corporal Works of Mercy are listed as follows:

- 1. Feed the hungry
- 2. Give drink to the thirsty
- 3. Clothe the naked
- 4. Giver Shelter to the homeless
- 5. Visit the sick
- 6. Visit the imprisoned
- 7. Bury the dead

The Spiritual Works of Mercy are listed below:

- 1. Instruct the ignorant
- 2. Counsel the doubtful
- 3. Admonish sinners
- 4. Bear wrongs patiently
- 5. Forgive offenses willingly
- 6. Comfort the afflicted
- 7. Pray for the living and the dead

Although it does not occur to many people, these works of mercy give us an operational definition of what it means to actually be merciful. Taken at face value, they can seem like just random ways we could be nice to people. In fact, on that superficial level, these lists can even seem contradictory. For instance, how is it merciful to both forgive willingly and admonish sinners? The key to understanding how these lists define mercy is asking, "What do these lists have in common?" When you apply this question, the actual definition of mercy becomes clear. To be merciful is to treat others in a manner that demonstrates their worth in the eyes of God.

We engage in works of mercy such as clothing the naked because every child of God deserves to be dressed in a manner that reveals his or her dignity as a son or daughter of the King of Kings! We feed the hungry because every person deserves to know that he or she has a rightful place at the royal feast set at God's table! We forgive willingly and bear wrongs patiently because we recognize the challenges involved in becoming saints and because we try to be generous about the struggle that's part of that process. And yet, when those we love forget who they really are, neglect to

strive for greatness, and, instead, decide to wallow in their brokenness, we admonish them, not to condemn or judge but to invite them to remember that they were meant to be more and to live more fully than they are.

### YOUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD

As important as the external works of mercy are, what we do for others is equally important in our own spiritual journey as being merciful to ourselves.

How can we cooperate with God's desire to transform us from the inside out into new creations? What does it mean to live out the command of Ephesians 4:24 and "put on the new, created in God's way in righteousness and holiness of truth?"

There is a saying that "God loves you just the way we are, but he loves us too much to let us stay that way." Just as you love your children for who they are today while simultaneously knowing that they are destined for so much more, your heavenly Father loves you for who you are but calls you to a greatness beyond your wildest dreams – divine sonship. God wants to make you – a mortal, sinful being – into a new person who will be perfected in Christ, capable of living forever and destined to being united with God's infinite love for all eternity. He wants nothing less than to make us "share in the divine nature."
