Dear Sir/Madam:

We are in the midst of a country-wide movement to overcome poverty and replace it with prosperity. For the first time in Canadian history over 150 municipalities are represented by cities committed to reducing poverty and nearly all provinces/territories have or have committed to a poverty reduction strategy. Today as the federal government considers a National Housing Strategy and a National Poverty Strategy we need to work together at every level right across this country in the fight against poverty. Poverty reduction must be a priority for all of us in 2017.

As municipal leaders across Canada know, our communities cannot truly prosper if we let poverty persist. While existing municipal services often help level the playing field, municipal governments of all sizes are also taking direct aim at poverty reduction itself. The City of Medicine Hat, for example, recently came out with an ambitious new anti-poverty strategy. The City of Toronto has adopted a Social Procurement Program, and the City of Victoria is looking to adopt an action plan to increase community benefits through leading economic change, social enterprise development and social procurement.

I am pleased to formally invite you to attend *Cities Reducing Poverty: When Business is Engaged*, a pan-Canadian gathering organized by Tamarack Institute in partnership with the City of Hamilton taking place this April 4-6, 2017 in Hamilton, Ontario. This Summit is the largest gathering of people who are working to end poverty in Canada and beyond. It is a forum for learning about solutions and innovations, forming and deepening relationships with one another, and exploring opportunities that will help all of us advance our poverty reduction work. The goals of the summit are to:

- Understand urban poverty and its impact on our cities' economic and social prosperity;
- Share successful solutions in poverty reduction work from cities and the business sector that are addressing urban poverty effectively; and
- Develop best practices to strengthen poverty reduction policies and actions in Canada.
