

The Mayor's Task Force on Poverty Elimination in 2014 engaged a diverse group of community leaders to develop EndPovertyEdmonton strategy and its 5-year roadmap. It also led to the creation of EndPovertyEdmonton, a community-led entity tasked with stewarding the implementation of the 5-year road map.

BACKGROUND

The Medicine Hat roundtable for poverty reduction began its work in June 2011. Over 120 individuals from the business Community, people with lived experience, service providers and elected officials have had input to the process. The strategy includes 17 Key milestones and 3 Key Outcome Areas

United Way Elgin Middlesex is the lead agency implementing London's poverty reduction strategy, London For All. The United Way brings together partners to implement plans, ensures evaluation and accountability, reports back to the community, and meaningfully involves folks with lived experience of poverty in all aspects of the project.

BACKGROUND

The City of London currently has poverty rates are higher than provincial and national averages. London For All is a road map that guides their rights-based approach to ending poverty.

Living SJ is also the Community Inclusion Network for the region from Saint John to Sussex, connected to the NB Economic and Social Inclusion Corporation and the Province's provincial poverty reduction strategy, Overcoming Poverty Together.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

POPULATION: 44,520



Everyone is HOME: Yellowknife's 10-year Plan to End Homelessness, Homelessness in Yellowknife and the North is a legacy of Canada's colonial past, intimately tied to the ongoing impacts of residential schooling and intergenerational trauma. As such, homelessness is much more than someone's lack of housing or shelter – it is a manifestation of dispossession, displacement, and disruption for people, families, and entire Indigenous communities at a spiritual, social, and material level.

BACKGROUND

Overall, the strategy is a housing first plan as a result of Indigenous homelessness as a legacy of colonialism, the voices of lived experience, migration and rural homelessness, housing, urbanization impacts, the prevalence of homelessness.

FOCUS AREA

- 1. Development of the federal anti-poverty strategy to ensure it reflects northern goals and priorities
- 2. Provide oversight and request accountability on the implementation of the Government of the Northwest Territories Anti-Poverty Action Plan (2015)
- 3. Lobby the territorial government to continue indexing income assistance rates
- 4. Lobby the territorial government to implement universal day care and preserve funding for early childhood development
