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The History of St. Marcus Church

The story of St. Marcus begins in 1872, when St. John's Lutheran Church and school opened a new location to make more room for their students. They bought a house and a 50-foot lot, where the current church is now, then used the first floor of the house for a one-room school. On June 13, 1875, thirteen families organized a new congregation that they called St. Marcus, which is the German name for St. Mark. It is not really known why they left the congregation, but it is thought that they did it to make transportation easier, since they were mostly poor families who would have to walk. The new congregation bought the house and land, then called Rev. Joseph Westenberger to teach the whole school during the week. He also led worship on the second floor of the school on Sundays.

After six years of growth, the congregation acquired a second lot. They moved the school to the back of the lots, then built a larger space to serve as a church. The congregation continued to grow rapidly, and they again ran out of room! They decided they needed an even bigger space. The next sanctuary that was built is the one that we still have today. Construction began in 1913 and was completed in February, 1914, which means that the building is over 100 years old! The church was renovated quite a few times. The first major renovation was in 1950. The original altar and pulpit were removed, and a lot of blonde woodwork was installed, according to what was stylish at that time. The members thought that the old woodwork was too fancy. In 1998 The current pulpit and altar were added. These two items were originally in the old St. Jacobi church before they tore it down. They also removed the blonde woodworking because it did not match the style of the church. In 2013 new carpeting was installed, as well as new flooring for the chancel, the flooring in front of the altar.

For a long time they stayed in the original school, expanding to the second floor, and added on another building. The school started out with grades 1 through 7, but between 1900 and 1914 they expanded to kindergarten through eighth grade. In 1894 the building was moved and a newer larger campus was built. The original school still exists at 2717 N. Pierce. The school that was originally on our campus was torn down in 2002 and our middle school building was built. You can still see parts of the old building. In the front lobby under the trophy case is the cornerstone with the year it was built. The sign above the Wehr Gym is from the old building, as well as the bell that hangs above the parking lot.

In the new building each class had about 70 students. Not all of the students attended the church and vice versa. The church was mainly German. They spoke German completely up until 1914, when they had one English service a month, and eventually one a week. The school taught English sooner than the church. During the 1950s and 1960s more African American members joined the congregation. In 1960 some of the congregation members wanted to move out to the suburbs due to racial tension, but they voted and decided to stay. Through it all, the congregation has stuck together and grown as a family. St. Marcus has an amazing history and you are a part of it!

The St. Marcus School Garden

Have you heard about the St. Marcus School Garden? Mrs. Shorts is our Activities Coordinator. She helps organize the field trips, yearbooks, school pictures, and fundraising, and she was the person who got the garden started last year. I asked Mrs. Shorts a few questions to learn more about the garden project and how we can get involved.

Why a school garden? Mrs. Shorts wanted to start the project for several reasons. She wanted scholars to learn where foods come from and how plants grow. She also wanted to provide a nice a quiet "green space" on the campus for scholars to go and read, sing, or create art. "School gardens that are located in the city also provide a great place for our pollinators which are butterflies and honeybees and other pollinators," she said. It's important for a school to have a garden because it can help educate scholars and families on how to grow and use healthy foods. Right now, the garden is specifically a "school garden" because we haven't invited neighbors around the garden to use it. "At this point it is just used to teach scholars about where food comes from and how it grows."

What kinds of plants can we hope to see in the garden? Tomatoes, cucumbers, green beans, squash, green peppers, carrots, lettuce, radishes, basil, dill, parsley, lavender, and chocolate mints are the veggies and herbs Mrs. Shorts plans to plant. St. Marcus scholars will help make this happen! "Students will begin growing the plants in their classrooms in April," said Mrs. Shorts. "At the end of the school year, classes will plant them in the garden. In the fall when students come back, they will help harvest the vegetables and herbs and learn how to use them." While the plants are growing during the summer, Mrs. Shorts will need help watering and weeding the garden beds. She had about fifteen St. Marcus scholars join her in May of last year "to build and plant the garden beds, along with several other St. Marcus teachers, staff, and some volunteers from Wisconsin Lutheran High School." Youth Impact: Prevent Cigarette Smoking

Smoking is a huge problem because a large amount of people start to smoke and become addicted before they're 18. Everyone knows it can be hard to stop smoking. After all, there is something called nicotine that is in cigarettes which makes it a powerfully addictive drug.
