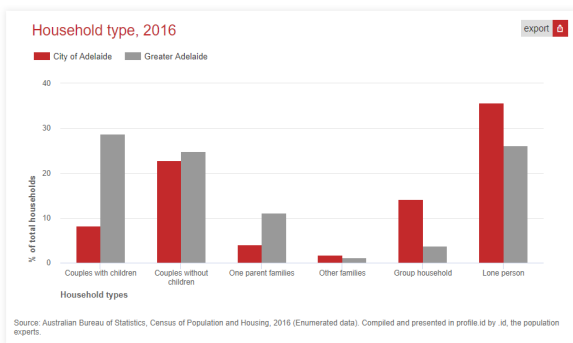


Household types

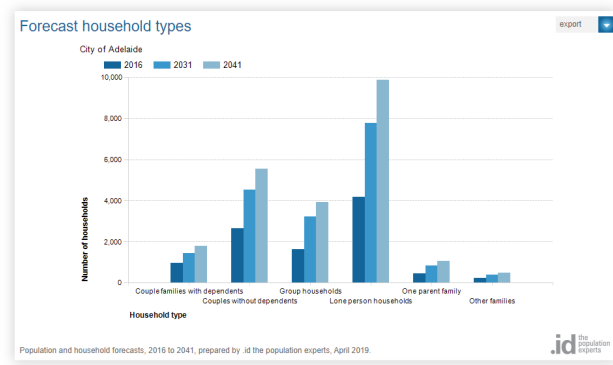

Forecast household types

.id's population forecasting team take into account the 'suburb lifecycle' and other predictable demographic trends such as migration patterns to determine the most likely future mix of household types in an area.

If you have forecast.id available in your area, this is a valuable datapoint to include, to demonstrate the 'role and function' of your neighbourhood.

Tip: Use the *Year range* slider at the top of the page to select any forecast interval for your table and charts. 2016-2031-2041 is just one option.

What is the dominant tenure type?

'Housing tenure' tells us whether homes in your area are Fully owned, mortgaged or rented (be it social housing or privately rented).Ho

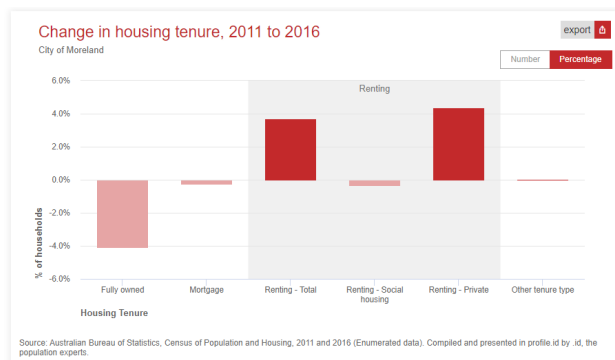

Follow the same steps above. Beneath the 'Housing tenure' chart, you will find the 'Change in housing tenure' chart.



Tip: Look at the *Change in tenure* in percentage terms. An increase in renters corresponding with a decrease in mortgaged or owned homes can be an indicator of housing affordability pressures.
