wenty years ago, there was just 2.5GW of installed wind capacity in the US. Ten years ago, this had grown to 35GW. And, during 2019, the industry passed 100GW. That's phenomenal.

Each decade has brought monumental changes and challenges, and the wind industry has looked very different at the end than at the beginning. No doubt we will see huge changes during the 2020s too as new technical and financial evolutions come into force.

On the technical side, this will include larger turbines onshore and offshore; major advancements in hybrid renewables projects including wind, solar and storage; the growth of fixed-foundation and floating offshore wind in North American waters; and digital services that will overhaul the way companies manage projects profitably.

On the financial side, this will include new ways of managing wind farm risks using hedging agreements; contract structures to support growing demand for renewable power among a wider range of corporate buyers; and any tariff support that utilities and developers may be able to secure from the federal government. A lot may hinge on this year's presidential election but talk about a Green New Deal gives us hope.

All being well, this should combine to help you all to build more profitable companies and deliver more profitable developments – although you can't take that for granted. The pain that firms in Germany are facing shows how quickly a market can turn.

And it is with this in mind that it feels like a good time to take stock and think about who we believe are the most influential figures in the North American wind industry as we enter 2020. If the sector is going to experience huge changes of the sort we outlined above – and it will – then it makes sense to look at who's leading now.

That is what we do in this North American Power List, which Tamarindo Group's

UTILITIES AND DEVELOPERS TAKE THE LEAD

Utilities are the best-represented group in the final 100, with 23 entrants (see chart). This puts them ahead of developers (22) and investors (15).

This is to be expected given that these are the firms that are developing the large onshore and offshore projects that companies throughout the industry rely on. It also puts them at the sharp end of changes like the end of the wind production tax credit, although the recent one-year extension will likely spark a fresh construction boom.

Policy uncertainty will continue under President Trump and in the run-up to the 2020 presidential election, but this top 100 gives us reasons to be positive. Continued support for wind from US bighitters including Berkshire Hathaway, NextEra and Xcel Energy, as well as more European entrants, shows that the market remains attractive.


M&A REMOVES SOME FAMOUS NAMES

A wave of acquisitions has removed some of the best-known developers that featured in the last North American Power List in mid-2018. Firms that have been sucked into larger players include Deepwater Wind, Infinity Renewables, Lincoln Clean Energy and Tradewind Energy.

Of these deals, the decision by Tradewind co-founders Rob Freeman and Geoff Coventry to quit the company and spin out utility-scale solar and battery storage firm Savion in 2019 shows us that we should expect more people to move between the sectors. Increasingly, the large players – from utilities and advisors to manufacturers and contractors – will tackle all technologies.

And finally, the decision by Canada Pension Plan Investment Board to buy Pattern Energy in a \$6.1bn deal played a key role in shaping the top five of this list. See that on pages 12-13.

OFFSHORE WIND MAKES A SPLASH

US offshore wind has arrived. This top 100 features people from 11 utilities and developers that are pursuing large wind projects off the east and west coasts, including Avangrid, Copenhagen Offshore Partners, EnBW, Equinor and Ørsted. And that doesn't even mention the huge interest from turbine makers, investors and a wide range of advisors.

The Trump administration's decision to subject the fledgling offshore wind industry to more environmental impact assessments over the summer will have unnerved many, not least the developers of the 800MW Vineyard Wind. The US Bureau of Ocean Energy Management has since confirmed that the federal government is committed to supporting this industry – but we will only really relax when we start to see more steel in the water.

We will discuss these issues and more at our Financing Wind North America conference in Boston in May.

And, despite the excitement around offshore wind, plenty aren't buying in. NextEra, Pattern Energy and Enel Green Power are three who see the offshore wind industry as too risky, and onshore wind still dominates this list (see right). We will find out in the coming years whether this is a strategic decision that they come to rue.


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GREATER DIVERSITY OF CORPORATES

Renewable energy power purchase agreements have historically been the domain of large technology companies that want to use wind and solar to power their data operations. But the inclusion of 12 people from corporates in this top 100 shows that renewable energy is now attractive to a wider range of energy-intensive industries.

The corporates on this list include online giants Apple, Amazon, Facebook and Google; automotive companies American Honda and General Motors; and other household names including Budweiser brewer InBev, sports brand Nike, and telecoms giant AT&T.

Top 100 breakdown by wind sub-sector






STILL A LONG WAY TO GO ON GENDER

Twenty-seven of our final 100 are women, compared to 23 in our previous North American Power List in 2018. This shows that the industry is going in the right direction in terms of the gender diversity in its top roles, but that there is still a way to go if wind companies want to make sure they are attracting and retaining a broad range of talented individuals.

Notable changes this time include Laura Beane, who left her role as president and CEO of Avangrid Renewables in October, and Geisha Williams, who left Pacific Gas & Electricity in January 2019 after steering the company into bankruptcy.

However, the fact that 18 of the women in the North American Power List are in for the first time shows there are plenty of talented professionals ready to take on the baton.

MICHAEL POLSKY

Duke Energy Renewables is far from the largest utility on this list, with just 3GW of assets. But its work under Caldwell on bird safety is garnering great attention and helping improve the perception of wind as a whole. Robo has led NextEra since 2012, and last year saw it become the world's first utility with a market capitalisation over \$100bn. The company owes this in large part to its wind operations: NextEra operates more than 15GW of wind farms in its 46GW portfolio.

MIKE GARLAND

President & CEO, Pattern Energy Group

High-profile takeovers of developers have been a major feature of US wind during the last two years – but few have attracted as much attention as the \$6.1bn buyout of Pattern Energy by Canada Pension Plan Investment Board that was announced in November and is due to close by the end of June. It is a hugely significant deal that makes Mike Garland a worthy number one.


Garland has worked in renewable energy and infrastructure for over three decades, during which he has overseen the development, investment and operation of nearly 10GW of renewables projects worldwide, and nearly \$50bn of infrastructure assets.

This includes Pattern Energy, where he has served as chief executive since it was founded in 2009 along with its sister business Pattern Development. The group now has a 4.4GW portfolio of 28 renewables projects in the US, Canada and Japan. He said that the \$6.1bn buyout by CPPIB reflected the strength of the platform that he and his colleagues have built.

We see the deal as significant for the industry for a few reasons.

First, it is a reminder of the ups and downs that US renewable energy yieldcos have been through over the last decade. In these structures, companies formed separate development and operational arms so that they could list the operational arms on the stock market – the 'yieldco' – and use funds raised to support the development arms. But the model ran into trouble in mid-2015, most notably with SunEdison's collapse, and has been tarnished since.

Pattern Energy always seemed more conservative than its peers, and thus was not among those hit hardest by shifting investor appetite for yieldcos.



Even so, CPPIB's decision to merge Pattern Energy and Development feels like a break from that past.

Second, the emergence of CPPIB as the buyer for Pattern is a strong reminder that there are giant Canadian investors, including Brookfield, still targeting wind buyouts.

And third, the support of a cash-rich pension fund giant would seem to put Pattern on a stable financial footing as it targets more growth in North America and overseas. It is one of those rare North American developers


to target overseas markets, entering Japan in early 2018, and CPPIB should be keen to support those international plans. CPPIB itself has teamed up with Enbridge to target European offshore wind deals.

Most significantly, it appears that this deal will enable Pattern Energy to continue as a standalone company – rather than being subsumed into a larger utility as many of the developers bought in recent years have been. While takeovers often mark a time for founders to make a change, we expect Garland to stay in US wind for years yet.
