## T O I L E T S

### THEN

Traditional toilet systems combine a bowl and flushing tank outside of the wall. The system is relatively bulky in size and rests on the bathroom floor.



### NOW

In-wall flushing technology offers more design freedom thanks to space savings. It also consumes less water and creates a more hygienic area.

## V A N I T I E S

### THEN

Manual faucets are included in the center of the vanity counter. A square-shaped mirror hangs above the vanity with cabinets that stretch to the floor.



### NOW

Wall-mounted vanities — equipped with automatic faucets (a newer trend to the residential space) and round mirrors — offer more square footage for radiant flooring and storage.

## L I G H T I N G

### THEN

In terms of task lighting, bulb-and-socket features are used to illuminate the vanity area. Meanwhile, a surface-mounted ceiling light provides ambient lighting.



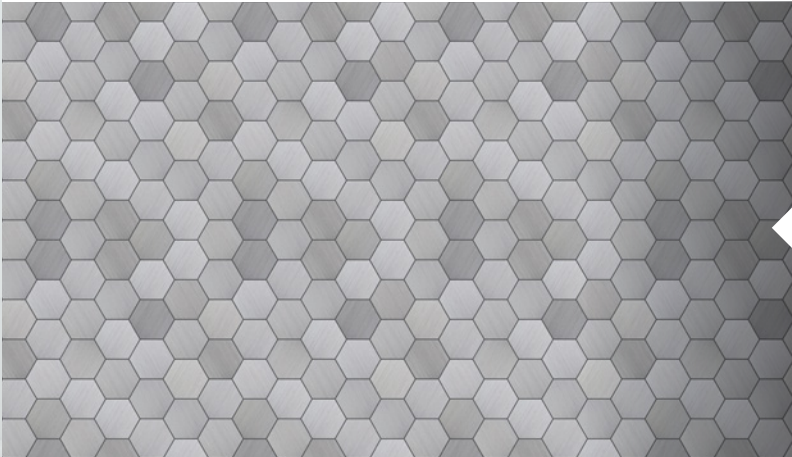
### NOW

Mounting lights on each side of a vanity help eliminate unflattering shadows. Recessed lights save on space and contribute to the relaxed state of the space.

## F L O O R I N G

### THEN

White, square tiles are laid side by side in a grid pattern across the floor. The edges of the grid lines meet the walls for a clean, simple look.



### NOW

Asymmetrical, geometric tile patterns add depth and elegance to bathrooms. Hexagon and arabesque are just two eye-catching designs.
