Today's message delivered from 1st Corinthians 3:16-23 states, "Brothers and sisters: Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy that person; for the temple of God, which you are, is holy".

To reflect on this message, I think about the journey I've traveled during my time at Neumann University. 


