I thought to myself, that if it takes a few conversations to get to know someone why should I be worried about someone's opinion if they don't even want to have a conversation to know even the slightest portion about my life.

Just like this week's scriptures, I learned that it is so important that you get to know someone from who they are inside not by your impression of their outside. And so that Sunday we loaded up the vans to return to Neumann; but this time, it wasn't with 20-plus strangers, it was with 20-plus friends.
