At Mass, the readings that we listen to each Sunday always have a lesson that tends to give us insight on how to live our daily lives. Some messages give us more direction than others, but I feel as though this week's readings speak to the Neumann Community as we begin a new semester of a new academic year. After reflecting on the readings, the meaning that I drew from these passages was learning to know when to give advice and when to take it. Throughout our lives, we have all been through a time when a decision had to be made and we just couldn't do it alone. Sometimes, we are that voice of reason for someone else, whether they take your advice or not. Sometimes, someone else is the voice of reason for us.

In the first reading, the prophet Ezekiel talks about turning away from evil. He states, "But if you warn the wicked, trying to turn him from his way, and he refuses to turn from his way, he shall die for his guilt, but
