## this week in campus ministry

It was hours before I was due to be at the airport and my luggage still wasn't packed. Clothes were half folded all over the floor with every other miscellaneous item I felt I couldn't live without for four months. I was going to study abroad and I needed to make sure that I had everything from my favorite pair of socks to basically my entire bedroom. I tried to fit everything inside my suitcase so it would close with ease, but by the third failed attempt I knew that I needed to leave some things behind. Little did I know that my panic was all for nothing - my adventure ahead would hold more than my entire suitcase ever could.

My biggest lesson I learned while studying abroad was simplicity. I learned that it's the people you interact with, the experiences you have, and the stories you have to tell that are what make you wealthier than any material belonging ever could. While in Ireland, I visited Galway, a city that is so full of culture and life. While I was there I didn't feel the need to visit the cliché tourist spots or buy souvenirs. Instead I just wanted to soak in the sights and sounds of the surrounding pubs and rainy Ireland air. I

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wanted to listen to the sounds of each person's familiar yet different accent. There was nothing more I wanted than to just feel present in the moment of being in Ireland. No tangible item even comes close in comparison to what I experienced.

After reading this week's Gospel, I reflected on how I have the tendency to get caught up in material things and that they tend to cloud my view of how I need to live as a steward for God. In the Parable of the Dishonest Steward we hear about a steward who wasn't true to his master and the consequences he had to face. Before reflecting I wasn't completely sure what a steward was, which is a shameful since one of our RISES values is Stewardship. In any case, I learned that a steward is someone chosen to take care of another's goods and to have stewardship is to be responsible with those goods. This made me come to the realization that we are called to be good stewards. We were created and chosen by God to live lives devoted to taking care of God's "belongings". Now, God's belongings aren't ones that you can pack up in a suitcase per se, but are the people with whom you interact every day.
