University-wide Theme for 2016-2017: Live the Truth in Love: Service

Inherent in the mission of Neumann University is the challenge to place knowledge at the service of others. The call to service invites us to be attentive to the needs of all, especially the least among us. Francis and Clare of Assisi repeatedly referred to the Gospel accounts of Jesus' life and teachings to understand the meaning of service. They taught by word and example the importance of serving others with love, compassion, and respect.

As a Catholic university in the Franciscan tradition, we emphasize three aspects of service:

- We serve with humility, compassion, and love.
- We challenge unjust structures and work for social transformation.
- We embrace service as a life-long commitment.

A commitment to service is deeply engrained in all of us at Neumann University. Since 2012, Neumann University has been recognized annually for our commitment to service by inclusion on the <u>President's Higher Education Community</u> <u>Service Honor Roll</u>. This national award honors colleges and universities whose commitment to service significantly impacts their communities.

In October 2014, 645 students completed the <u>National Assessment of Service and Community Engagement (NASCE)</u> survey. Interestingly, 49% of students stated that they participated in service at college; however, 81% said that they were engaged in service prior to college. Responses indicated that students engage most frequently in service related to combatting hunger, improving health, and supporting children and youth and to a lesser extent in service connected with civic participation, economic development, elder care, environmental concern and advocacy, homelessness, and religion and spirituality.

In Fall 2015, 259 faculty, staff, and administrators responded to a similar survey. 72% of the respondents reported that they participate in some type service. According to survey responses, Neumann personnel are highly engaged in service related to civic participation, eldercare, health, religion and spirituality, and youth. To a lesser degree personnel serve in areas related to economic development, environmental concern and advocacy, homelessness, and hunger.

Throughout the year, we will offer opportunities to reflect on *Service in the context of the Characteristics of Franciscan Higher Education*. The Association of Franciscan Colleges and Universities developed the statement on the *Characteristics of Franciscan Higher Education* to assist the 24 institutions to develop a common understanding of the basics of our Catholic Franciscan tradition. On Welcome Back Day, August 24, we shared an invitation to participate in these conversations. Be sure to register for the session in which you will participate!

Coincidentally, the Association of Franciscan Colleges and Universities (AFCU) has launched a National Service Initiative this year. During September and October 2016, all 24 AFCU institutions have been invited to promote and highlight service activities. In addition, the AFCU Board has signed a Message from the Franciscan Family in the United States in support of Pope Francis Jubilee Year of Mercy, identifying the National Service Initiative as an expression of the commitment of the Franciscan colleges and universities to be instruments of mercy, reconciliation, and peace.



Mass of the Holy Spirit

Catholic colleges and universities traditionally begin the academic year with a special Mass asking for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Spirit of Assisi Celebration October 27, 2016



On October 27, 1986, representatives of major religions accepted the invitation of Pope St. John Paul II to gather in Assisi to pray for Peace. This experience came to be called the *Spirit of Assisi*. St. John Paul II chose Assisi as the location for this day of prayer because St. Francis is a symbol of peace, reconciliation, and brotherhood. In

January 1993 and again in 2002, religious leaders from all over the world returned to Assisi to pray for peace.

On Thursday evening, October 27, 2011, more than 150 members of the Neumann University community and Sisters of St. Francis of Philadelphia gathered to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the first *Spirit of Assisi* in solidarity with those who joined Pope Benedict XVI in Assisi as

pilgrims of truth and pilgrims of peace. The Neumann community gathered in silence with lighted candles which served as reminders that each of us can be a light to spread peace in our world today.



On Thursday evening, **October 27, 2016**, Neumann University will celebrate an inter-faith *Spirit of Assisi* prayer vigil for Peace. The candlelight vigil will begin at 7 PM in the Sacred Heart Chapel and close with a re-dedication of the Peace Pole and procession to the Lourdes grotto on the grounds of Our Lady of Angels Convent.
