University-wide Theme for 2013-2014 Live the Truth in Love: Stewardship

We are delighted that so many members of our campus community have chosen to participate in the various programs and activities designed to promote understanding of Stewardship in the Catholic Franciscan tradition! The Lunch and Learn mini-sessions for faculty were quite popular. Twenty-four faculty members participated in the sessions on Care of Self; 13 faculty members attended Care for Creation; and 20 faculty members participated in Catholic Social Teaching. In addition, 13 employees attended the September session on the Spirituality of Recycling, and 10 individuals visited Red Hill Farm. To date, 36 individuals have participated in the half-days of reflection on Care of Self, 13 have attended Care of Creation, and 11 chose to reflect on Catholic Social Teaching.

All of the programs described above, except faculty mini-sessions, will be repeated in the coming weeks. See details later in this newsletter. In addition, please consider sharing in one or more of the Lenten Soup and Sharing sessions which will take place from 12:30 to 1:30 on Fridays beginning March 14 and concluding on April 25.

We also encourage you to integrate the value of Stewardship into your work, your personal life, and your teaching as appropriate. The monthly reflections prepared by the Care of Creation Committee are archived on the Mission and Ministry and Care of Creation websites http://www.neumann.edu/stewardship/topics.asp These reflections are excellent for personal reflection or as an inspirational way to begin a meeting or a class.

VALUE Focus for 2014-2015

During the 2014-2015 academic year we will focus on *Live the Truth in Love: Reverence*. Recent discussions of the NIFS committee have revealed that most Neumann employees and students can readily name the RISES values; however, not everyone is as familiar with the Catholic Franciscan Tradition (CFT) and how the theological, philosophical, and spiritual components of CFT are the foundation of the RISES values. As we focus each value over the next few years, we will address how the CFT foundation is our point of difference.
