## University-wide Theme for 2017-2018: Live the Truth in Love: Excellence

At Neumann University, we emphasize three aspects of *Excellence*:

- We perform to the best of our ability the responsibilities entrusted to us.
- We practice cooperation, rather than competition, in the quest for excellence.
- We foster academic achievement through a strong teaching-learning community.

As we reflected on *Excellence* in preparation for this year's theme, members of the NIFS committee developed the **ABC's of** *Excellence*: **Aim high! Build relationships! Create community!** 

During the 2017-2018 academic year, we invite everyone to take time to reflect personally and communally on the value of *Excellence*. We encourage every department to devote 15 minutes each month, as part of a regularly scheduled meeting, to reflect together on *Excellence*. To facilitate this reflection, we have provided a booklet entitled *What Pope Francis says about Community and Unity*. The reflections in this booklet invite us to recognize the value each of us adds to the Neumann community, the importance of nurturing a culture of encounter, and the need to promote unity and peace on our campus and beyond. Members of the NIFS committee have also contributed ideas for reflection and sharing. Samples of these ideas were distributed at Welcome Back Day; additional examples are available on the <a href="NIFS website">NIFS website</a>. In addition, we will offer two half-days of reflection each semester on the theme of *Excellence*. These days will provide time for personal reflection and sharing with colleagues.

### **Characteristics of Franciscan Education**

During the 2016-2017 year, 238 members of our faculty, staff, and administration participated in at least one of the 33 conversations held to consider the Characteristics of Franciscan Education. Sixteen employees chose to participate in more than one conversation! We have collated the ideas and questions shared last year and will deepen our exploration of the Characteristics this year. Three terms, in particular, generated extensive conversation: sacramental, conversion, and diversity. To clarify the meaning of sacramental in the Catholic Franciscan tradition, we have invited Sr. Ilia Delio, OSF to speak on November 30. Sr. Ilia is an internationally respected Franciscan scholar who currently holds the Josephine C. Connelly Endowed Chair in Theology at Villanova University. Sr. Ilia will speak on the afternoon and evening of November 30. The afternoon presentation will begin at 2:40 and conclude at 4:00 in the Meagher Theater. The evening session will begin at 6:30 and conclude at 8:00 in the Franciscan Spiritual Center. The evening session will include dinner at 5:30 PM at Our Lady of Angels Convent for those interested. In 2015, Pope Francis declared September 1 as a World Day of Prayer for Creation. In recent years, more than two billion people of good will have begun to celebrate September 1 to October 4 as a *Season of Creation*, a time to pray and act on behalf of creation. # International Day of Peace (September 21) and Spirit of Assisi (October 27)

In 1981, the United Nations established the International Day of Peace in the hope of encouraging all people to commit to peace and nonviolence. In 1986, Pope John Paul II invited leaders of various faith traditions

to gather in Assisi to pray for peace. For the past 30 years, Pope Benedict XVI and Pope Francis have continued the tradition of gathering religious leaders in Assisi to pray for peace. We invite you to consider how you can actively pray and work for peace.

On September 27, Pope Francis will officially launch a program in support of refugees and migrants. In the United States, there will be a week of prayer and action from October 7 through 13. ## The Sultan and the Saint



During our conversations on the Characteristics of Franciscan Education last year, there were many questions about the meaning of supporting "every person on his/ her lifelong journey of conversion." Some suggested that "personal transformation" might be a more appropriate term than "conversion." In the Franciscan tradition. there is definitely not a desire to "convert" others in the sense of imposing a faith tradition or even a way of thinking on another person. The story of St. Francis' encounter with the Muslim Sultan Malik-al- Kamil during the Crusades in 1219 powerfully demonstrates the importance of reverence for persons of differing religious and cultural traditions, as well as the tragedy when such differences are not respected and embraced. In April 2018, we hope to host the film, The Sultan and the **Saint**, and a discussion on interfaith and inter-cultural dialogue. 


