The average U.S. "comfort index" for a place to live is 44. Rapid City, South Dakota, ranks far above that at 61.

Surprised? With plenty of sunshine and a low annual rainfall (18 inches compared to the U.S. average of 37), Rapid City has plenty going for it, much like its southern neighbor, Denver.

And, like Denver, the snow it gets in the winter tends to disappear quickly in the arid climate. The average July temperature is 86!

At 3,200 feet above sea level, it's a midway point between the Black Hills and the Great Plains in its neighboring southern states.

The Rewards of Rapid City

Diversity

The population continues to grow, in particular Native American, African American, Asian, Hispanic, and multi-race residents. The city's Native American population has grown nearly 40 percent in the last 10 years. Rapid City serves a region of 475,000 residents throughout a 200-mile radius.

Arts, Culture & Dining

From the Black Hills Symphony Orchestra to concert halls to wineries and chic dining spots, Rapid City has supplemented the natural beauty of the landmarks and national parks surrounding it with the perks and pleasures of a big city.

Nature's Splendor

Rapid City is known as the "The Gateway to the Black Hills," but it's also the gateway to a lot more, from the Badlands to Wind Cave National Park to the rich colors and contours of the area known as the Dakota Hogback. And, while humans carved them, don't forget Mount Rushmore and the Crazy Horse Memorial.

No State Tax

Education

Rapid City has 23 public schools and 12 private and parochial schools that educate more than 14,000 students. Post-secondary options in the region include the South Dakota State College of Nursing, University Center-Rapid City (a partnership among the state's six public universities), the University of South Dakota Department of Nursing, Black Hills State University, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, and the venerable, engineering-centric South Dakota School of Mines & Technology.
