I tap into my resources and build some heavy wooden doors

to keep out the mobs. Yikes—I don't have enough weapons and food yet. I have to go back outside, but I'm losing time.

Here they come.

Moans, groans, and hissing sounds fill the air as an army of Minecraft monsters invade my world. There are fast-moving skeletons, lumbering zombies, and creepy spiders. They're definitely in attack mode. These aren't passive or neutral mobs. The creatures on my doorstep are aggressive! My best defense is shelter.

But I'm caught outside trying to gather more supplies for the night. I move as quickly as I can through the thick trees. Suddenly...creepers! They are spawning everywhere.

Quick—run!

This time my legs become a blur as I rocket home. I scream through the front door just in time and find a corner, where I hunker down for the night. (I haven't yet created a bed.)

I'm safe inside...for now.

After what seems like an eternity, nightfall covers my Minecrafty world. I peek out a window. *Yep, the freak show is in full swing*!

But something even stranger catches my eye. I can almost see my friends among the monsters outside. I imagine a neighborhood kid named Eddie dragging his feet with the zombies. (He does a pretty good imitation.) Skinny Kyle is blending in with the skeletons. And the more I look, the more I realize that Minecraft mobs are like different groups at school. You know the types—those who love to make fun of people... otherwise known as *bullies*. And to be honest, that's who I'm up against right now.

At school, bullies walk around in groups, acting as if they own the place. And when one turns his attention on me, the rest of them seem to want a piece of the action. They say they are just joking around and I shouldn't get upset, but their hateful words spawn like a creeper mob.

#### GAMEPLAY SECRETS

Mobs (short for "mobiles") are a fact of life in Minecraft. They include villagers, animals, and monsters. They can turn otherwise peaceful gameplay into turmoil. The aggressive mobs are the worst ones. They attack players on sight, and not just when they're provoked.

But I have a survival tip that can save your life...



#### Dragee90's Best Tip

Monsters cannot see through glass or ice blocks. So always build windows on your shelter. This way, you can spy on them

without being detected.

#### Read It

"There are six or seven kinds of people the LORD doesn't like: Those who are too



proud or tell lies or murder, those who make evil plans or are quick to do wrong, those who tell lies in court or stir up trouble in a family" (Proverbs 6:16-19).

When you're attacked by creeper-controlled "aggressive mobs," do you stop and think before you speak? Or do you push back with anger, fueling the fire? Do you pray? How would Jesus want you to react?



#### Live It

There will always be mean people in the world. And since we can't always avoid them, it's a good idea to have a plan for when they



attack. The best defense is to know that we are wonderfully and creatively made by God. We have a special set of skills that God wants to use to make the world a better place. Our identity is not decided by a few jerks who are just trying to look cool in front of others. So take a deep breath and resist fighting back in the same hurtful ways. Instead, find shelter. God has our back, and He has given us *real* friends. Step back and look at the troublemakers through the glass window. You'll quickly see their actions in a new light.



o, go, go...and then *jump*! Downward I fly until I land safely on the glass ceiling of my dome. I don't see any danger, but I know it's just around the corner. I may as well go into the woods to see what adventures this world has to offer.

I race through the trees, dodging branches, cliffs, and the occasional animal. I move toward a warm orange glow just beyond the trees. Suddenly, I'm on the edge of flowing lava.

I can't go left, I can't go right, but I might be able to make it through the narrow passage straight ahead. It's decision time. *Never mind!* I play it smart and decide it's time to shop. So into the villager trader I go.

Sometimes we can just feel the danger ahead. It can be a group of kids who gather in the hallway at school. You know the kind—they find strength in numbers and make fun of people as they walk by. Or maybe it's a grumpy old man who likes to let his barking dogs out into the yard every time someone passes by. Or even an older sibling who is annoyed by your every move.

These everyday dangers aren't always avoidable. There are times when we have to just walk straight through them. It's a good thing we have real-life armor to wear. I'm not talking about the heavy knights-in-shining-armor kind of gear that brave warriors strapped on long, long ago. I'm talking about the armor of God. God has given us armor that helps us do more than just survive. He has given us *truth*, *righteousness*, *justice*, *peace*, *faith*, and *His Spirit*. Best of all, it's free. We don't have to save up, purchase it, or even earn it. It's just a bonus of being a child of God. All we have to do is grab it, wear it, and walk through life's lava pits with confidence.

Back in the game, I notice that I have a lot of iron units to tap into as I trade for some armor. I choose boots, a helmet, and some trousers. Done. I jump back into the game and check my armor durability in the corner of my screen.

It's time to run for my life. I lean forward and run on the middle path right through the lava. For a moment, I can't even see what my next step holds. But I push through.

#### GAMEPLAY SECRETS

Leather, gold, chain mail, iron, and diamond—each of these elements can be crafted into a player's all-important armor. And wearing this kind of protection is essential for survival, especially in PVP (player versus player).



#### Dragee90's Best Tip

I like to create my armor out of diamonds. They provide the greatest defense against attack, but they're also the hardest to

acquire. Also, *always* wear your armor (and bring a torch) when you head into a dark place, such as a mine.

#### **Read It**

tect you like armor. Your desire to tell the good news about peace should be like shoes on your feet. Let God's saving power be like a helmet, and for a sword use God's message that comes from the Spirit" (Ephesians 6:14-17).

#### Live It

I'd never face a hostile Minecraft mob without my armor...and it's the same way in real life. So just as today's Bible passage instructs, I put on my spiritual armor:



*The belt of truth and the Bible, our sword.* The better my grasp of Scripture, the bigger my belt buckle. So I read God's Word.

- The gospel of peace, our combat boots. If we're not wearing our combat boots, it's like we're walking on thorny ground in bare feet. It's a good idea to put them on before leaving the house. How? Connect with Jesus through prayer and share your faith through your very life—being kind and loving to others.
- *The shield of faith.* Jesus is our shield (Psalm 84:11) and the source of our faith (Galatians 2:20). He protects us from the flaming arrows of the evil one.
- The helmet of salvation. Salvation is all about a thrilling life with Jesus, which is His gift to us (John 10:10). Every minute we're enjoying that excitement, our helmet is on. And with that helmet firmly in place, our minds are guarded from Satan's lies.

# God Loves Misfits

But God is so rich in mercy, and he loved us so much, that even though we were dead because of our sins, he gave us life when he raised Christ from the dead.

ou might think someone as amazing as Jesus would have come from a line of rich and famous people who totally followed God and never did anything wrong, but that's actually not true at all. Some of the people in Jesus's family tree were poor. Others were thought of as different or strange. Some were big-time sinners. You can even add wicked kings to the bunch. The truth is, Jesus came from a long line of misfits!

Your family doesn't have a lot of money? No problem! Jesus Himself was born in a stable, the son of a carpenter, not a prince who was born in a palace. You're not the most popular person in your class? That's just fine! Jesus wasn't very popular with His own people. Your best friend isn't speaking to you? Not to worry! Jesus knew what it was like to have a best friend turn on Him.

Want to know something really crazy? Jesus was a misfit. Totally telling the truth here! No, He didn't sin. But He did His own thing. He didn't act the way people expected Him to act. He didn't hang out with the people others expected Him to hang out with. He may not have even looked the way people expected Him to look. The people were expecting a powerful king, not some carpenter-turned-teacher who was leading around a sketchy group of followers. You might even call Him the "misfit Messiah."

That's good news for us! You can be exactly who you are, and God will love you. You don't have to look perfect. You don't have to act perfect. You don't have to be perfect at all. You just have to believe that Jesus—who *was* perfect—was the Son of God and that He died for your sins (your imperfections). That's all that matters to Him!

Jesus, thank You for Your love and grace. Thank You that I don't have to be perfect and that You love me and accept me just the way I am.

### Peanut Butter Rice Krispies Treats

My grandmother's Peanut Butter Rice Krispies Treats were the first thing I ever learned to make on my own. I was eight the first time I could make them, and I still make them to this day. So of course this is a recipe I wanted to share with my kids! My son kept telling me he could make them by himself too, so when we had time in the kitchen...just the two of us...I let him "make" them. I did the stove part since he's only five, but he did the rest!





#### INGREDIENTS

1 cup sugar 1 cup light corn syrup 1 cup creamy peanut butter 6 cups Rice Krispies cereal

In a small saucepan over medium-high heat, bring the sugar and corn syrup up to a boil, stirring continuously. Once it's at a low boil, remove from heat and stir in the peanut butter. Pour the peanut butter mixture over the cereal in a large mixing bowl. Combine quickly until the cereal is covered and then spread it out in a well-greased (I use Pam) 8 x 8 baking dish. Cool at least 10 minutes before cutting into squares.

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
