





ONLINE SHORT COURSE IN SKIN CANCER SCREENING





The course program is based on the suite of skin cancer certificate courses delivered in collaboration with The University of Queensland, which has been attended by over 6,500 medical professionals worldwide. The objective of the short course is to provide GPs with a fundamental skill-set to screen and identify suspicious skin lesions in a busy general practice.

COURSE CONTENTS AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Part I: FULL-BODY SKIN EXAMINATION How to provide a systematic, best-practice full-body skin cancer examination for patients.
- Part II: SUSPICIOUS SKIN LESIONS How to identify and manage suspicious skin lesions.
- Part III: DERMOSCOPY How to use dermoscopy in assessing suspicious skin lesions and minimise the risk of missing an obvious melanoma.
- Part IV: 3 POINT CHECKLIST How to use the 3 Point Checklist to assess skin lesions, including training images and case discussions.

Professor Wilkinson is registered as a general practitioner and public health medicine specialist. He has published research papers on skin cancer, designed and led the development of the only master of medicine degree in skin cancer, and helped develop a suite of skin cancer certificate courses for general practitioners.



ELIGIBILITY

The short course has been purpose-built for GPs with no or little previous training in skin cancer management who would like to develop these essential skills in an outcome-driven online program that fits into their busy schedule.

With the majority of skin cancer work managed in primary care, every GP practising in Australia should have fundamental skin cancer diagnosis skills to help improve patient outcomes and save lives.



GPs have over 1 million patient consultations per year for skin cancer.



Research has shown that an untrained GP will have a NNT of 30:1 for melanoma but with some training this can drop to 17:1.



With over 12,000 melanoma and over 800,000 non-melanoma cases each year, Australia has the world's highest skin cancer incidence.



There is only about 450 dermatologists in the whole of Australia and patients with no access to specialist help.



2 in 3 Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer by the age of 70.



Over 2,000 people die from skin cancer in Australia each year.
